The Jersey seems to be the established dairy breed for Coos County and it is Coos that we are interested in. There are more Jerseys here than all other dairy breeds combined, and we produce more butterfat than any other county in the State and it is the butterfat that we get paid for, not the water. The Jersey cow milks more than seven days out of each year; it is therefore safe to give her a year test rather than only a seven day test. The highest producing cow out of 5313 tested in the State for the month of June was a Jersey belonging to Ralph Cope. She made 55.7 lbs. of fat in thirty days.

In talking "Berkshire hogs" among the farmers, I find that most of the farmers consider their business of producing pork and my business of producing breeding stock to be a long ways apart; and the reason for this is that there has been too much said in the past about fancy show hogs, as if a show hog was in no sense the kind of a hog for the average farmer to keep. The fact is, the good show hog must have the qualities that make for the greatest production of pork in the least time on the least feed. I know that nearly all farmers appreciate the value of good blood in their stock, but many of them do not realize that it takes careful, constructive breeding to establish prepotency in animals, and this work is expensive.

Value of Cottage Cheese.

Curry Sends Its Quota

Man at Bandon Ordered to Report at American Lake Cantonment.

Curry county has sent its first percentage of the drafted men called in the first draft, and has announced the names of 18 of the 21 who must go. Others have been examined, but up to last Thursday, the district board at Eugene had not certified the full quota.

The list includes: Dillion W. Miller, W. T. Waggle, C. Antonio, H. R. Plaisted, K. V. Willit, C. Atkinson, Floyd J. Huntley, Harry G. Andrew, H. W. Gauntlett, R. A. Keiser, C. C. Bentley, F. W. Hult, W. D. McGill, Delmar H. Miller, Gilbert M. Anderson, Peter Erasthiades, S. A. Walker, Ellis D. Miller. This includes all those accepted who did not claim exemptions, except C. W. Smith of Port Orford, and J. M. Caughell of Gold Beach, the former of whom it is said was granted an agricultural exemption.

Miller Was in Bandon

The other day when the call came for Curry to send one man as its first percentage of the draft quota Dillion Miller, first man on the list, was in Bandon. He was notified immediately that he must appear at American Lake training camp. Fred Caughell of Gold Beach then drove to Bandon by auto with the transportation, and order for meals for the drafted man.

On September 19th eight more will leave for American Lake, and so on down the list until the twenty-one drafted men are in training camp.

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PRaises Coast Road Scenery

Eugene Man Says California Also Has Some Bad Roads.

W. F. Gilstrap, manager of the Morning Register of Eugene, Mrs. Gilstrap and the A. A. Fimm family of the same city, were in Bandon the latter part of the week on their way home from an auto tour of California. They went south via the Sacramento valley, returning from San Francisco via the coast route.

"Not all the bad roads are in Oregon by any means," said Mr. Gilstrap. "In fact the worst road one could find anywhere is between Dunsmuir and Redding, California. The road up the coast was quite rough and in some places it was very dangerous. At a number of points it skirts the cliffs overlooking the ocean and the least accident or loss of control of the car would plunge it into the boiling sea. At a point between Ft. Bragg and Westport we were shown the place where a car only a short time before had plunged over the precipice into the ocean, one man being killed and three others injured. The road up the coast to Bandon was rather difficult, several rocky places and stretches of loose sand being encountered. The scenery was the finest one could wish, however, and we were well compensated in coming this way."

SEVERAL DROUTHS OCCUR DURING PAST 15 YEARS

Summer of 1906 Said to Have Been Even Drier Than the Season Just Passed.

The dry record so far as the official records for the past 15 years show, was not equalled by the recent drouth, says the Eugene Register, published at Eugene where the climate for the past few months has closely resembled that of this section in respect to dryness.

There were seventy-one days on which it did not rain this year, which is two days below the record of 1906. In 1906 the weather records show that a "trace" of rain came down on two occasions, as also the records show for the 1917 drouth, but the duration of the previous dry spell was two days longer.

There have been but three other dry spells that approached the recent drouth. In 1905 there were 55 dry days, and in 1910, 66 days passed without rain.

Was Arrested and Fined

Gold Beach Reporter: Last week, near Langlois, an automobile driven by Sam Malehorn, south bound with passengers, was run into by an auto bound for Bandon, driven by a Coquille boy named Kitchen. Malehorn's car was considerably damaged, losing a wheel and otherwise being badly used up. The passengers were badly shaken up, but not injured. The boy continued on at increased speed, not heeding a demand to stop. Finding out who the occupant of the car was, he was arrested later and brought to Gold Beach for trial, yesterday (last Wednesday), accompanied by his father and other members of the family. Pleading guilty to the charges preferred, he was fined \$30 and costs, and damages paid for the wreck of the auto, the boy's father standing good for the expense. A few more such suits would be a good thing hereabouts, as there is entirely too much reckless driving on the roads by irresponsible parties. There have been several such accidents in Curry the past week or so, but fortunately none resulted in injury to any one.
