MARTHA ELIZABETH FISH

Martha Elizabeth Dunlavy was born at Watertown, Wisconsin on November 23, 1844. She was married to Hiram M. Fish on April 14, 1861, in Minnesota. and moved to Oregon in 1882, where she had since made her home. Five children—Mrs. Laura Edmunds and E. B. Fish of Bandon; Mrs. H. A. Todd and Albert Fish of Arago, and Frank Fish of Coquille—survive her. Fifteen grandchildren also survive her. Deceased passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. L. M. Edmunds, on Saturday, September 8th, after a long illness. The funeral services were conducted from the home by Rev. J. S. Tilton, and the remains were laid to rest in the G. A. R. cemetery by the side of those of her husband who died on February 12th last.

Manufacture of hard liquors during the period of the war ceased on September 9th when the Nation's food control bill became effective. It has been estimated this will save 50,000,000 bushels of grain for other more important uses. Liquors is bonded warehouses may be withdrawn and sold. Upon this liquor the government tax of \$1.10 per gallon has been raised to \$3.20. A stock of 230,000,000 gallons is now in the warehouses.
