More Tourists to Travel Next Year

Pacific Northwest Tourist Association Preparing to Spend Large Sum of Money.

Last winter the legislatures of Oregon and Washington and the parliament of British Columbia appropriated \$112,000 as an advertising fund to attract tourist travel to the Northwest.

The Pacific Northwest Tourist association is the organization for spending the funds, and the board of directors has just concluded a meeting at Seattle where plans were made for beginning the big drive to attract the vacationists of the world to the Northwest in 1918. It should be understood that the only paid representative of the organization is the secretary, Herbert Cuthbert of Seattle who draws \$300 per month. All other officers work for nothing, the directors even paying their own railroad fare and hotel bills when attending the frequent meetings.

During the past summer it was thought that the war would make it impossible to secure tourist travel to the Northwest. But, notwithstanding that influence, the advertising which the tourist association placed in automobile and newspaper mediums west of the Rocky mountains had the effect of bringing more visitors than Oregon has ever had in any previous year.

Consequently the directors took steps for vigorous advertising during the coming winter and have established connections which give the Northwest direct representation in 35 cities of the United States. One hundred thousand booklets showing the scenic resources of Oregon, Washington and British Columbia are being printed, as are booklets on fishing, hunting, golfing, motoring and mountaineering. These are to be distributed direct to interested people through the agency of the "ask Mr. Foster" service, the largest and most efficient tourist bureau of the world. Special exhibits are to be maintained at Atlantic City, New York and in three tourist centers in the South. Northwest literature will be kept fresh in the leading hotels and railway offices in New York, Washington, Detroit, Chicago, Philadelphia, Buffalo, Indianapolis, Omaha, Atlantic City, Cleveland, St. Louis and Minneapolis.

Forty thousand dollars are to be expended this winter in printing a series of advertisements in the leading newspapers and magazines that are circulated in the centers of population where the most tourist travel is originated. These newspapers and magazines are being carefully selected, and the advertising will be placed by a Pacific agency. Ten thousand display cards are to be printed in four colors and hung up in the garages and leading hotels of the country.

A specially prepared invitation is being printed to be sent to all governors, mayors, presidents of auto clubs, and other organizations, asking them and their members to spend a vacation in the Northwest.

When the sections of America where the snow is heavy are this winter digging snow, they will suddenly be confronted with an advertisement calling attention to the mild winters of the Northwest. When they swelter next summer, the ads will again remind them of the delightfully cool season out here.

NAVY SERVICE SHORTENED

Men Who Enlist Now May Quit at End of War if They Desire.

United States navy recruiting officers have received new forms from the navy department, making possible release of enlisted men during June and December during times of peace. If they served one year at sea, it is believed that this will result in a large increase of enlistments. Heretofore the enlistments in the navy have been for four years. Any eligible now wishing to join the navy may do so, and if peace comes before the four-year term is concluded, may, if he elects, receive an honorable discharge without cost during the months stated.

21 BILLIONS APPROPRIATED

Government Expenditures Exceed Limits of the Mind to Grasp.

Washington, Oct. 5—Chairman Martin of the senate appropriations committee, in a review of achievements of this session of congress and of appropriations and contract authorizations for the fiscal year 1918 issued today, says the session breaks all records.

Total appropriations aggregate \$16,941,566,815, which with the total appropriations for the second session of the 64th congress and the total contract authorizations for the present fiscal year makes a grand total of \$21,390,730,940 in appropriations and contract authorizations for the present fiscal year.

A Fish Harvester

New Invention May Revolutionize Fishing Industry Here.

An invention that may mean much to Bandon in days to come when the great tonnage of seafood now going to waste is properly appreciated, is illustrated in this month's issue of Popular Mechanics.

It is an enormous fish harvester estimated to be capable of capturing and delivering to the dock of its vessel 300 tons of fish in a 10 hour period. It consists of a specially constructed boat of odd lines, equipped at its prow with a large adjustable steel trap which ensnares the fish and leads them to a conveyor. The harvester would be used at night and its work aided by search lights. The projectors would illuminate a triangular area extending far in advance of the craft, which is designed to travel at a speed of about 10 miles an hour. The fish, the inventor points out, attracted by the light, would congregate in large numbers in the direct path of the boat. Lack of illumination immediately in front of the trap would momentarily confuse them and cause them to be guided by the walls to the rapidly moving conveyor.

Physically but Not Fistically Unfit
Elmore B. Spurgeon, the first drafted man in Curry county, was rejected as physically unfit for service in the army, says the Port Orford Tribune. This fact may have misled some of the young men of the neighborhood. Anyway rumors have been coming into town of some attempted rough house stunts at the Sixes dance Saturday night. And one young man at least is carrying around open evidence to the weight of Mr. Spurgeon's hand when backed up by righteous indignation. The fact is, that while he was rejected for enlistment and while he is also very good natured, yet young Spurgeon is one of the huskiest men in this section, as was learned to their sorrow by those who tried to "take things" when he was around.

What Game Laws Provide
Don't shoot more than thirty ducks in any one day nor in any one week, nor between sunset and sunrise. If you want to keep within the law. There is a closed season until September 1, 1918, on the following migratory game birds: Wild or band-tailed pigeons, little brown, sandhill and whooping cranes, swans, curlews wood ducks, and all shore birds except black breasted and golden plover, Wilson or jack snipe, woodcock and the greater and lesser yellowlegs. Open season for ducks, geese, rails and coots, October 1 to January 15; shore birds, black breasted and golden plover, Wilson or jack snipe, woodcock and greater and lesser yellowlegs, October 1 to December 15. Bag limit of ducks, geese, rails, coots and shore birds, 20 in any seven days. Full copies of the game laws may be obtained free at any of the local ammunition supply stores.
