preparing the machinery taken from
the old Peart mine for use at the
Eureka mine at Riverton, which is
to be reopened. Officers of the com-
pany are expected to arrive in the
county from Eureka, Cal., in a short
while.

About 700 Class One Men
According to Sheriff W. W. Gage
the number of men placed in Class
One under the draft questionnaire
number about 700 out of the 1957
men registered in the county. These
men are being called to Coquille at
the rate of 20 per day for physical
examination. This number is to be
increased, according to Mr. Gage, as
the examining physician is able to
handle a larger number.

Oregon Has 20,000 in Service
Oregon's contribution of men to
the war totals 20,000, according to
figures compiled by Governor Withy-
combe. Of this number, 2,055 are
with the 3rd Oregon, 1,700 with the
Coast Artillery, 400 with the cav-
alry, 600 with hospital units, 250
with officers' reserve corps, 200 in
medical reserve officers, 5652 with
the navy and marines, 717 in selec-
tive service under first draft, 700
with the infantry and 7,320 enlist-
ments just previous to classification
under the questionnaires.
