They had been the guest of Mrs. Tanner's sister, Mrs. C. E. Brown of North Bend, for the past month.

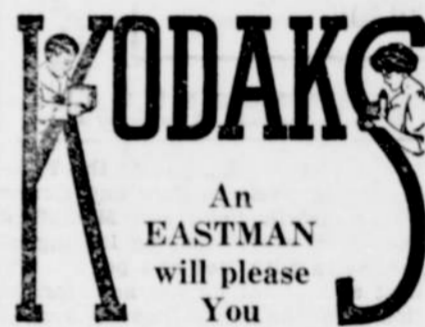
