COMMUNITY SENDS BIG QUOTA IN DRAFT

INSTRUCTOR IN HIGH SCHOOL AMONG THOSE GOING IN THE CALL.

Twelve Local Men to Wear the Khaki for Uncle Sam—Will Be in Artillery, Going to Ft. McDowell, California, Latter Part of Next Week—Manager of World in List.

Coos county has been called upon to furnish a quota of forty-nine men under the draft, to leave for Ft. McDowell, California, the latter part of this month. However, several of the men coming under the call are now residents of Alaska and cannot arrive in time, and for that reason at least one local man whose name was not in the first list given out, has been called as an alternate.

Bandon and community men coming under the call are: John T. Royer, John G. Leuthold, Andrew A. Thorhaven, James H. Howe, Reanous J. Cochran, Edmund W. Gallier, Harold L. Young, Jesse R. Cochran, Ray Wyant, Almer Flanders, William Nygren, G. A. Gates.

Mr. Royer is the son of Mr. and Mrs. H. Royer of Bandon; Mr. Leuthold is the son of Mrs. and Mr. John Leuthold, and has been employed in the logging camp at Leneve; Mr. Thorhaven is a married man, son of E. A. Thorhaven of Langlois, and until recently employed at North Bend. Mr. Howe's home folks reside in southern Idaho. He is half-owner of Western World, and leaves the business in the hands of his partner until after the war. Mr. Gallier is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. M. Gallier, and an employe of Bandon Hardware Co.; Messrs. Cochran are brothers, their home being at Parkersburg; Mr. Young is a local man, employe of the Young Shingle Mill at Two Mile; Mr. Wyant is a local man, employed at Moore mill; Mr. Nygren is a member of the local Nygren family, employed at one of the logging camps, and bringing up the rear as almost last man of Coos county's quota. Mr. Gates is instructor in the Bandon High school, his home being in northern California. He goes to fill the quota from Marion county, Ore., having been a student at Willamette University at time of draft registration last year.

These men go as members of the 1500 delegation being sent from Oregon under the emergency call for 51,000 men throughout the nation, and go to Ft. McDowell, California, where they will be inducted into the service as members of artillery regiments. Exact date of entrainment has not yet been announced by the adjutant general's office, but the men are scheduled to leave between May 29 and June 2.

REPORT SAYS BANDON SHIPYARD TO OPERATE

Mayor Topping Receives Word at Marshfield That White Bros. are Enroute Here.

Mayor Geo. P. Topping, while enroute to Portland, Monday, is reported to have received word that the local shipyard is to be opened at once, that White Bros. had purchased it and had made another payment, and that representatives of the new owners are enroute here to begin operations. The Coos Bay Times says that Captain Snyder of the Sampson had informed Mr. Topping that the men are enroute here to start work on private contracts.

The Times also says: Mr. Topping said that negotiations had been practically closed to secure a factory to make starch and other products from potatoes. They are also negotiating for a loganberry plant.

Moore of Company A, Coos Guard, left Monday for Portland to attend the Oregon War Conference which was in session there this week. YOUTHS REGISTER ON FIFTH OF JUNE

SOUTHWEST COOS MEN, JUST 21 YEARS OLD, MUST REGISTER WITH C. B. ZEEK.

Local Board Gives Information as to Procedure to Be Followed and Announces Other Details—Persons Failing to Register Will Be Imprisoned and Later Put into Army.

The Local Board for Coos county is authorized by the United States war department to register all men who have become twenty-one years of age since June 5, 1917, for classification under the selective draft. The date for holding such registration will be June 5, 1918, thruout the nation.

The following registrars have appointed for the respective localities of Coos county: C. B. Zeek for Bandon and territory, at his office, Bandon; Chas. St. Dennis, Lakeside; J. A. Smith, North Bend; M. G. Duncan, Marshfield; Local Board for Coos County, Coquille; E. A. Dodge, Myrtle Point; E. J. Loney, Powers. Persons subject to registration can be registered by the Registrar that is nearest them, or the one they can reach with the least trouble and expense. Registrars will not be appointed for each voting precinct as in the registration of June 5, 1917, but all must appear and be registered by one of the registrars named above.

DISTRICT QUOTA IS NOW ASSURED

The Bandon district in the big Red Cross drive will be well over the top before the close at the end of this week. The members of Company A, Coos Guard, who have had charge of the campaign are working enthusiastically and drive headquarters in the Gallier building is one of the busiest places in town.

On Monday and Tuesday there was no solicitation but subscriptions were received at headquarters. The net returns during these two days amounted to more than half of the quota allotted to the city of Bandon. Wednesday night the Bandon precinct quota had been exceeded, the total being \$1439.65. The entire precinct has not been covered as yet and the work will continue until everyone is solicited.

The first precinct within the Bandon district to complete its campaign is Bullards, C. D. Jarman, chairman. This precinct had a quota of \$75. It responded with more than double that amount, \$153. Bullards has set the pace that will probably be maintained throughout the entire district.

Chairman E. F. Topping of the Parkersburg district reports \$186 collected, with still ten more people to call on. Parkersburg's quota is \$199, so that precinct is almost 100 per cent over-subscribed.

Prosper, with a quota of \$250, is getting along nicely, according to S. D. Harper, chairman. He reports that at the close of headquarters last evening \$165 had been subscribed, although soliciting had not yet begun.

R. H. Rosa by telephone reported last evening that Two Mile had more

than \$50 subscribed so far and that the quota of \$100 will be more than raised.

The Bandon district campaign is being managed by Chairman H. J. McDiarmid, who is largely responsible for its splendid success. ELECTION BRINGS SOME SURPRISES

WITHYCOMBE AND McNARY WIN OUT IN STATE WITH GOOD MAJORITIES FOR BOTH

Geo. P. Laird Wins Nomination for Sheriff on Republican Ticket by Nine Votes Over Ellingson—Armstrong Is Badly Defeated by Coos Bay Man—Gage Wins.

There were a few surprises in connection with the election Friday and they were not all agreeable. In the first place Coos county's favorite son, L. J. Simpson, didn't run as strong as expected in other parts of the state, although his home county gave him a splendid boost. James Withycombe, present incumbent, took on an unusual burst of speed, and it is safe to say, exceeded his own expectations. He was nominated by a big majority. Olcott, who was most feared by other candidates proved to be a bugaboo; and Moser was right along in a class with Harley. In the senatorial race McNary won over Stanfield with a good majority.

Laird Nominated Sheriff

The most interesting contest among county candidates was for the office of sheriff. The four candidates ran neck and neck, and at the finish Laird led the bunch, his nearest competitor being Ellingson, who was only nine votes behind. McCulloch also had a close run with Robison for surveyor, winning by 45 votes. The biggest surprise was the vote for commissioner, Mr. Armstrong being defeated by a vote of almost 6 to 1. The big combination that went out after his scalp was too much for him. Even the Bandon section turned him down, although they gave him almost a 50-50 vote. There was probably some personal satisfaction gratified in local quarters by seeing him defeated, but after the Coos Bay man gets in it will probably be interesting to watch the doings of the county court from a local standpoint.
