## RED CROSS FUNDS ARE STILL GROWING

COMMUNITY WILL DOUBLE ITS QUOTA IN THE BIG DRIVE OF LAST WEEK.

Thirty-Five Hundred Dollars in Bank and Several Precincts Yet to Hear From—Campaign Was Splendid Success—Outlying Precincts Respond Liberally.

The Red Cross drive in the Bandon district was a remarkable success. When the returns are all in it is believed that the quota of \$2,000 will be doubled. The exact amount has not yet been determined as all the precinct committees have not been heard from, however Chairman H. J. McDiarmid says that at present the total is up to \$3,500.

## HONOR ROLL FOR RETURN OF FLOUR.

County Chairman Liljeqvist Wants People to Return Present Stock to Dealers.

County Chairman Liljeqvist of the Oregon Defense League has made a special appeal to Coos county housewives to return their present supply of wheat flour to enable the government to meet the demands for food for the troops of America and its allies in Europe.

All housewives should immediately return their supply of wheat flour to the dealer who will reimburse them and give them a receipt for it and the dealers or grocers will then return it to the government, said Mr. Liljeqvist. "We are going to start an honor roll of the women making this patriotic response.

"As to the need of it, anyone who heard the lecture of President Kerr of O. A. C., or who has read Ackerman's recent article in the Saturday Evening Post on conditions in Switzerland must realize it fully. It is up to everyone of us to respond to the limit.

"Beginning soon, I am going to publish an honor roll of the women responding."

## SOME CHANGES IN OFFICIAL RETURNS

Geo. Laird's Plurality is Twelve—Gage Had Practically Two to One Victory.

The county election board has completed the canvas of the returns of the primaries. There were few changes in the unofficial count published in the Western World. George Laird's plurality in the republican race for sheriff was increased to twelve, having 735 to 723 for Ellingson, the next highest candidate.

The final count on representative was A. K. Peck 1417 and Charles R. Barrow 1180.

Sheriff Gage ran little better than two to one ahead of J. M. Thomas, the final figures being Gage 595 and Thomas 251.

The official figures on county commissioner were John Yoakam 2373 and Geo. J. Armstrong 405.

At the primary election T. P. Hanley and O. A. Trowbridge, of Bandon, were nominated for commissioners of the Port of Bandon district by having their names written in and they will be candidates on both the republican and democratic tickets. Mr. Hanley has been a member of the Commission ever since it has been in existence.

According to an order from the federal food administrator there will be no more wheat flour sold until after the first of the month. Wheat-cess cook books issued by the government have been received for general distribution by J. W. Mast. They can be gotten at either the Library or at Mrs. Morrison's millinery parlor. Housewives are requester to secure them at once. The booklets contain eight pages of much valuable information for baking.

Failure to register means one year in jail. Sickness is no excuse. If too sick, send some competent person to explain and with authority to fill out your card. Unexcusable absence from your home district will not excuse failure to register. Go to the local board nearest the place you happen to be.

## Would Discontinue Day Power

The Bandon Power Company has made application to the Public Service Commission to be allowed to discontinue day service, claiming that the day service is not a paying proposition and the company is going behind each month. The application is supplemental to one made some time ago to raise rates. The latter has not yet been granted, although a hearing was held several months ago. To discontinue the day service would mean a great handicap to a number of industrial enterprises of the community, and would in fact be a bar to any new industries coming here or even considering this place as a location. It would put the town back into the country village class. The Public Service Commission announces that a hearing will be held at the City Hall in Bandon on Thursday, June 13th, beginning at 10:30 in the morning. The general public, and especially those interested in the industrial welfare of the community are invited to attend and give arguments for or against the proposed idea if they have any. Western World is not opposed to raising the rates for electricity, if necessary, but it is opposed to eliminating day service.

## WILL DEVELOP CHROME CLAIMS NEAR POWERS

Frank Bramwell and G. W. Kearns of Grants Pass Complete Investigations in County.

Frank Bramwell and George W. Kearns of Grants Pass returned home today from a tour of the Iron and Salmen mountain country about Powers and inspection of a claim south of Bandon in all of which chrome and copper are said to be very rich. They have been with J. R. Smith of Powers in many of whose claims they are interested.

Mr. Bramwell has some extensive chrome mine interests in the Crescent City and Illinois river section. He states that the deposits here are in quality and quantity to guarantee considerable financial returns. He expects to return in a few days to close up negotiations with many owners of claims in the Powers district. Actual operations this summer will result he states.
