Desk report for May: Books purchased 2; books donated 23; books repaired 41; books and magazines circulated 907; new readers registered 10.

Since we promised to buy no fiction while the war lasts, (except a few of the newest books for the rent shelf) gifts of books have been more generous than ever. Beside those reported above, nine new novels were brought in June 3. The Library appreciates these gifts. date these gifts.

We are still receiving books for soldiers. The war Library Bulletin for April is very interesting. It is on our reading table. Here is a brief report of what has been accomplished: 36 Camp library buildings erected, 117 librarians in the field, 464 camps stations and vessels served, 10,943 selected books sent overseas, technical, 1,349,000 gift books sent to camps and stations, 5,000,000 magazines distributed systematically.

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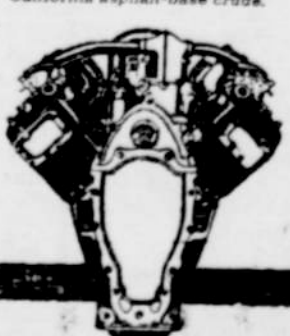
