

ANNUAL CITY OF BANDON BUDGET

TO THE HONORABLE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BANDON,
TO THE OFFICERS AND VARIOUS DEPARTMENTS
AND TO THE TAXPAYERS...

I, Mayor of the City of Bandon, have the honor to submit herewith recommendations and estimates for the expenses of the City of Bandon together with necessary funds to be raised to meet said expenses for the fiscal year, beginning Oct. 1st, 1918, and ending September 30th, 1919, the same being submitted under the provisions of Section 61 Page 22 of the City Charter and under the provisions and requirements of Chapter 234 General Laws of Oregon, 1913, and Chapter 222 Laws of 1915. These estimates are based upon current expenses of preceding years and the requisites of the term for which the estimates are made, with reductions or increase as deemed necessary in keeping with reasonable requirements.

IT IS ESTIMATED that it will require the following stated sums to pay the necessary expenses of each City department office or officer, improvement, maintenance or building, structures or institutions, or salary of office or officers or employees including repairs to public high-ways, roads, streets, and bridges and the construction, operating and maintenance of each public utility as hereinafter itemized and will therefore require a like amount of funds to cover each expenditure as follows, to-wit:

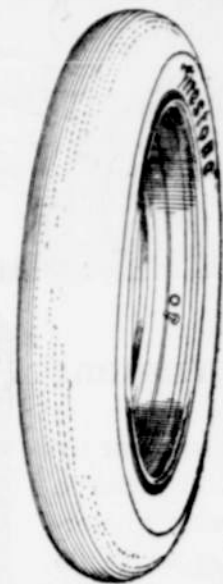

52,000 FEWER DAIRY COWS THAN IN JANUARY

Decrease Causes Alarm in State. Dairy Council Has Halted Rapid Slaughter.

Portland, Oct. 21.—Through investigation for its annual report, the Oregon dairy council has made alarming disclosures with regard to the slaughter of milk cows in Oregon. On January 1 of this year there were 227,000 milk cows in the state, and September 1 there were but 175,000, showing a loss of 52,000 cow in eight months. There has been considerable slackening of this slaughter since the dairy council has made plain to the dairymen their duty as patriotic citizens to keep the animals alive and give to the people the supply of milk so alarmingly jeopardized.

Tomatoes Ripen Here
If anyone doubts the possibility of ripening tomatoes here, they should talk to W. F. "Bill" Kennedy. Mr. Kennedy during the past week sold ripe tomatoes on the local market that were as fine as any that have been shipped here. They were raised on his place just outside Bandon. Captain Miller of the Steamer Acme bought one crate for his vessel. Captain Miller comes from California too, from where tomatoes are shipped to Bandon.

Road's Thick Ice Foundation.
At one point of a road recently constructed in Alaska, there is a solid ice foundation. At the surface there is a two-foot layer of moss and tundra, but previous mining operations at this point proved that there is a forty-foot bed of clear ice and six feet of gravel between the surface layer and bed rock.

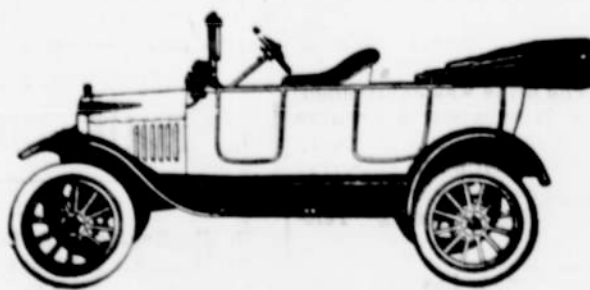
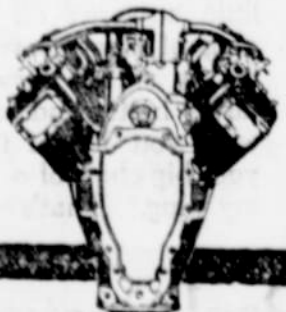
