SOME THINGS THE PACKERS ARE DOING

How the Meat Industry is Contributing to the Defeat of the Hun.

American packers are doing far more than merely furnishing meat foods to the soldiers and sailors of the United States and her allies, according to C. S. Churchill, Advisory Superintendent for Swift & Company, who addressed the American Meat Packers' convention recently.

"The general public realizes little of the work that the packer is doing to win the war," said Mr. Churchill. "We are furnishing a great deal of material for the manufacture of munitions, including glycerine, potash and sulphuric acid. Our sheep skins are used to manufacture cold-proof coats.

"Every pound of wool that we have is taken by the Government as fast as we produce it, and the price is fixed by the Government.

"There isn't a pound of stock food manufactured today that is not being used to help win the war, because it goes to put weight on live stock that is badly needed by our soldiers and sailors.

"The tons of fertilizer which we manufacture aid in growing more crops that will be used later to feed more soldiers to fight the HUN. Glue has its uses. Soap certainly is a big item. Albumen is another highly important product; it is now used in the construction of aeroplanes.

There are also many other products, too numerous to mention, not one of which, I believe, does not have an important place in the conduct of the war.

"We, of Swift & Company, believe in giving credit where credit is due and I want to say that our labor has performed cheerfully the giant task set for us by the Food Administration. No order has been too big, no job too overwhelming for them.

"Recognition of this willingness to serve has resulted in an increase for male labor totaling more than 100 per cent since February, 1916. In the case of our female help the increase has been even greater, this help now receiving 165 per cent more than in 1916."

To take care of the war business, Mr. Churchill said that all the packers in the country had been forced to build new freezers and buildings of every description at a cost two to three times greater than pre-war cost.

He paid tribute to the government inspectors of the Bureau of Animal Industry and for the army who select the meat, and said:

"In addition to the safeguard that this is to the soldier and sailor, it is a safeguard to us. It safeguards us from attack from those who for their own personal aggrandizement or for other reasons may seek to criticize unjustly one of the few industries that in the early days of the war, and up to the present time, has continued to supply our Government with what it wanted, as it wanted it, when it was needed, without quibbles as to price.

"That is a record of which we should be proud, gentlemen. It demonstrates that we are doing—not our bit, but our full share toward winning this war, doing it cheerfully, willingly and because we are in this war to win; and to win, our soldiers must be fed and fed with good food."

FISH HATCHERY IS READY FOR SEASON

Supt. Frank Smith Prepared to Take Salmon Eggs On Coos and Coquille River.

The Coos river hatchery is prepared to secure a large number of salmon eggs this year, says the North Bend Harbor. There are a good many Chinook in the river now which at high water will go up to the hatchery where they will be captured and the eggs secured. Eggs from Chinooks, silversides and steelheads will be taken. The same thing will be done at the Coquille river hatchery.

From last year's hatching Supt. Frank Smith this summer released about 3,500,000 fry; as many more it is hoped will be hatched and turned loose from this year's hatch.

A chinook salmon produces about 5000 eggs, a silverside about 3000 and a steelhead about 200.

these Projects, or, in other words, a net deficit in the road bond fund of \$27,387.66.

"That the general road fund shows an overdraft of \$97,126.10 which will be decreased by the amount of \$84,450.60 derived from the last half of the taxes now due and payable. This will leave a net deficit in the general road fund of \$12,675.50, or, a total net deficit in the two funds of \$40,063.16, and interest on the bonds.

"This manipulation of the funds against the wishes of the people of Coos county, as expressed at said election bonding this county in said sum of \$374,432.26 to be expended

on these various projects mentioned, we believe of sufficient moment for us to report to you for instructions.

"We still have some matters before us unfinished that we are unable to complete at this time.
