A few yields of spring grain will make a small crop. Hartman and Baddeley have a good field below town which is expected to average fifteen bushels

A few samples have been brought to Hamilton & Rourke's office at Weston, and all are of No. 1 grain. One is from the J. N. York place, which is yielding 35 bushels to the acre. Another big field of blue stem on the Steen estate, where from 30 to 35 bushels are obtained. A third from E. B. Duncan's field on the Key farm, where heading is now in progress. A sample of excellent grain from R. M. O'Brien's Wild Horse farm has been left at the Leader office.

Voracity of the Young of Some of the Prof. Lintner, New York's state enmologist, is of the opinion that the larvae stage of many species of in-sects is one of the sleepless activity, the grub feeding incessantly from the "moment of its birth." He says that it is doubtful if some species ever sleep or take a moment's rest. The voraciousness and rapid growth of these creatures may be better understood by making a statement of two facts: certain flesh-feeding larvae, (which simply means the infant state of a carrion beetle whose scientific name would be of no particular interest, says the St. Louis Republic) will consume in "twenty-four hours two hundred times his own weight—a parallel to which, in the human race, would be an infant consuming one thousand five hundred pounds of nutriment on the first day of its existence! There are vegetable feeders-caterpillars-which, during their progress to maturity, increase in size ten thousand during the first thirty days of their lives. To equal this remarkable growth a mature man would weigh scarcely less than fifty tons!

Lived a Lifetime in Twelve Years. The most remarkable instance of rapid growth was recorded by the French academy in 1729. It was a boy six years of age, five feet six inches in height. At the age of five his voice changed, at six his beard had grown, and he appeared a man of thirty. He possessed great, physical strength, and could easily lift to his shoulders and carry bags of grain that weighed two hundred pounds. His decline was as rapid as his growth. At eight his hair and beard were gray; at ten he tot-tered in his walk, his teeth fell out and his hands became palsied; at sign of extreme old age.

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
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
