[Scrip Invalid.]

An opinion handed down Monday by Judge Eakin, holds that \$20,900 worth of Baker county scrip is invalid, and Sheriff Kilburn and Treasurer Jett are enjoined from receiving the same in payment of taxes pending an appeal to the supreme court. The scrip is dated in 1887, and for work on the court house; also warrants issued for insurance on county buildings; for indexing the books of the county; for the purchase of a poor farm; building county roads and bridges in 1891 and 1892, and \$400 worth of scrip.

WILL OF JUDGE D'PEATT.

He Bequeaths to His Children, Jane Nellie and Katie, \$1 Each.

The will of Judge Edward DePeatt, of Athens, Oregon, was Monday admitted to probate. The instrument is dated September 23, 1895, and is witnessed by Jacob Bloch and James C. Stamper. It reads as follows:

First—I give and bequeath to my daughter, Nellie DePeatt, the sum of \$1 and no more.

Second—I give and bequeath to my daughter, Jane DePeatt, the sum of \$1 and no more.

Third—I give and bequeath to my daughter, Katie DePeatt, the sum of \$1 and no more.

Fourth—I give and bequeath to my son, William DePeatt, the sum of \$1 and no more.

Fifth—I give and bequeath to my son Ralph, \$300, to be placed on interest until he be of lawful age, when principal and accrued interest shall be his; also my law library, Remington typewriter, office fixtures and furniture.

Sixth—I give and bequeath to my daughter, Zelma DePeatt, the sum of \$500, to be placed at interest until she be of lawful age.

Seventh—I give and bequeath to my daughter, Merna DePeatt, the sum of \$400.

Eighth—I give and devise unto my beloved wife, Minnie L. DePeatt, all the rest of my real and personal property.

Ninth—I hereby appoint my beloved wife the guardian of my children Ralph, Zelma and Merna, and command and desire that she shall be appointed as such guardian without being required to give any bonds therefor.

Tenth—I hereby appoint my beloved wife the executrix of this last will and testament, and command and desire that she be appointed as such executrix without being required to give bonds therefor; and I hereby revoke all former wills by me made.

The county court yesterday appointed W. E. Young, C. W. Hollis and M. M. Johns appraisers of the estate.

A Deal That Failed.

A Portland gentleman connected with street railways in discussing the suicide of Judge DePeatt the other day, said:

"This tragedy recalls the attempt made by J. M. and L. D. Lively to buy the Portland street railway system. J. M. Lively of Port Townsend originated the plan. He communicated it to his brother, L. D. Lively, who was then connected with a bank at Athens, and Judge DePeatt. All three thought the scheme perfectly practicable, and J. M. Lively and DePeatt came to Portland and obtained an option on the lines, agreeing to make the purchase for something like \$5,000,000. They thought they would not have any difficulty in raising the sum, for they were of the opinion that capitalists would willingly put up a large amount of capital in order to gain control of all the railways of a city of Portland's size. They were mistaken in their calculations. They could not raise the money, and DePeatt returned to Athens a disappointed man, to resume his law practice, while J. M. Lively dropped out of sight."—East Oregonian.

A Neat Surprise.

W. S. Byers was treated to a pleasant little surprise Wednesday, says the E. O. It came in the shape of a gold watch chain of handsome design to which was attached in the form of a charm, an imitation sack of flour, made of solid gold, a strip of blue enamel bearing the words "Byers' Best," representing the label that is familiar to users of flour all over the world. Mr. Byers' name is engraved upon the charm. The present was made by Miss Sophia Byers, daughter of the miller, in commemoration of his sixty second birthday.
