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CITY TAKES WATER

FIFTY MINER'S INCHES IS APPROPRIATED.

Notice Posted at Source of Gravity System Supply and Filed With County Clerk.

The city of Athena has filed notice of appropriation of 50 inches of water, miner's measurement under a six-inch pressure, to be diverted from the natural channel of the outlet of certain springs known as the Gallaher and Pruet Springs in Rawhide gulch, the source of supply for Athena's new gravity water system. A copy of the notice was posted yesterday on the land where the water is appropriated, and a copy together with a map relative to the appropriation was mailed last evening by Recorder Chamberlain to the county clerk, to be recorded. The notice of appropriation reads:

Notice is hereby given that the city of Athena, municipal corporation duly incorporated, organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the state of Oregon, by virtue and under the laws of said state, has appropriated and intends to divert from the natural channel of the outlet of certain springs known as "Gallaher and Pruet Springs" located in the southwest quarter of section twenty-eight (28) and the north one-half of the northwest quarter of section thirty-three (33) in township four (4) north range thirty-five (35) east of the Willamette Meridian in Umatilla county, state of Oregon, which outlet is a stream bearing the name of Rawhide Gulch Stream, at the point of diversion hereinafter described, fifty (50) inches of water, miner's measurement under six inch pressure, for purposes of irrigation, household and domestic consumption, protection from fires, and the maintenance of the city fire department, and for watering livestock in said county.

Said municipal corporation has selected as a point of diversion and intends to divert from the natural flow of said Gallaher and Pruet Springs the amount of water above described at a point where said Rawhide Gulch intersects the south line of section twenty-eight (28) E. W. M. in Umatilla county, state of Oregon, on the southeast quarter of the southwest quarter of said section twenty-eight (28) known as the Gallaher lands, thence in a general northwesterly direction to and including the city of Athena situated on the west half of section nineteen (19) Township four

(4) north range thirty-five (35) E. W. M., at which point of diversion said municipal corporation proposes to establish head gate and dams and such other methods as may be necessary for the control of said water, and to construct a flume or pipe line whenever the same may be necessary, the dimensions of said pipe line to be ten inches in diameter and the flume or ditch to be of requisite dimensions for said water, said pipe line to be known as the "Athena Water Works Pipe Line," to be constructed and owned by the city of Athena, Oregon, and said municipal corporation intends to construct such branch pipe lines, flumes or ditches as will be necessary, and to improve said streams and springs if it so desires.

The general direction of said pipe lines to be northwesterly from its point of diversion to a point on the west half of section nineteen (19) in township four (4) north range thirty-five (35) E. W. M. in the city of Athena, Oregon, laterals from said main pipe line, ditch or flume to be used from all portions thereof available for irrigation, household and domestic consumption, protection from fires, and other purposes of said municipal corporation.

And said city of Athena claims ground sufficient for right of way for gates, dams, flumes, feeders, and pipe lines for use in connection with said head gate and pipe line, and also right of way for one reservoir, if the same shall be required, and the number of reservoirs are one, to be located on the said pipe line.

MUST PUT IN SCREENS.

Deputy Game and Fish Warden Nolf Will Strictly Enforce the Laws.

Deputy Game and Fish Warden Joe Nolf calls the attention of farmers' irrigating ditch companies and mill owners to the following section of the game laws, which he will rigidly enforce:

"Sec. 2064.—Any person or persons, corporation or corporations, owning in whole or in part, or leasing, operating or having in charge, any mill race, irrigating ditch or canal, taking or receiving its waters from any river, creek or lake in which fish have been placed, or may exist, shall put and cause to be maintained over the inlet of the ditch, mill race or canal, a wire screen of such construction, fineness, strength and quality as shall prevent any fish from entering such ditch, canal or mill race, when required to do so by the fish commissioner. Any person or persons violating any provisions of this section, or who shall fail to construct or maintain such screen, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$1000, and cost of the action."

CHANCES ARE GOOD

FRIENDS OF JUDGE FEE CONFIDENT HE WILL BE CHOSEN.

Morrow County Bar Endorses Candidacy of Pendleton Attorney for Federal Judgeship.

Pendleton, May 25.—Prospects are very bright for the appointment of Judge James A. Fee of this city as United States district judge of the district, no other candidate appearing to have such good chances for this distinction as the prominent Pendleton attorney.

Morrow county bar has heartily endorsed Judge Fee and have promised as a whole, to lend their every influence toward his appointment. Besides the bar of Morrow county, leading business men and prominent citizens have united in a concerted effort to secure the position for the judge and his friends throughout the state are all fully confident that the appointment will go to him.

It has been learned from his friends that the judge was unaware of their intention to place his name among the candidates for the federal judgeship, until after it had been done. The news of the death of Judge Bellinger and the wish of his friends that he attempt to be appointed as successor to the United States judge, was broached to Judge Fee the first time on the train between Pendleton and Heppner, by District Attorney Phelps, who was traveling with the judge. The judge is said to have said that he would allow his friends to make him a candidate, but that he would not enter the field personally.

This has been the course pursued by the judge throughout and it is stated authoritatively that Judge Fee has done nothing whatever to promote his chances, everything that has been done being the result of the efforts of his many friends without his solicitation.

The judge was not even aware that a petition asking his appointment had been circulated, until it was shown him after being signed by a majority of Pendleton attorneys and Circuit Judge Ellis.

No inkling of the intention of Judge Fee has been allowed to escape, but from his friends, however, the conclusion may be reached that the judge is in the race to stay now, and there is no danger of his withdrawing from the contest until it has ended by the success of one of the candidates. His friends have avowed their intention to stick with their candidate to the last ditch and refuse to admit the possibility of the failure of the success of their candidate. They state that Judge Fee's feelings are most friendly toward all candidates and that he would not think of making the race a personal matter, or make a bitter controversy of such a question.

DELEGATES APPOINTED.

Umatilla County Will be Well Represented at National Convention.

Umatilla county will be well represented at the National Good Roads convention which will be held at Portland June 21 and 24. Yesterday County Judge H. J. Bean appointed delegates to the convention as follows: C. A. Barrett of Athena, G. W. Probstel and S. A. Barnes of Weston; Frank Richmond of Helix, Matt Mosgrove of Milton, Jesse Baskett of Freewater, Henry Adams of Weston, Jesse O. Hales of Adams, J. P. McMann of Pilot Rock, H. C. Willis of Echo, D. C. Brownell of Umatilla, Charles Weiss of Freewater, Henry Schmitt of Athena, Julius Hudemann of Fulton, S. A. Lowell of Pendleton, Asa Thompson of Butter creek, C. T. Cockburn of Milton, William Dale of Helix, and R. Alexander of Pendleton.

It is expected that all of the delegates will leave Pendleton in a body on the morning of June 20 in order to be in Portland in time for the opening session of the convention. The people of Umatilla county will undoubtedly take a great deal of interest in the meeting as much enthusiasm was aroused during the meeting of the State Good Roads association, held in Pendleton May 15 and 16. A number of speakers of a national reputation have been secured to address the convention.—Tribune.

Gamblers Pay Fines.

The Morrow county grand jury has ended its duties after bringing indictments against twelve gamblers and owners of gambling houses. In the absence of Judge W. R. Ellis Judge Bradshaw presided over the cases. The gamblers were fined \$50 each. The grand jury brought no true bills against the violators of the Sunday closing law, recommending that such cases be handled by the municipality and by so doing the litigation would be less expensive to the taxpayers.

AT THE PIONEER PICNIC

All Preparations Made By Weston For Entertainment on June 2 and 3.

Weston, May 25.—Final arrangements for the Eleventh Annual Reunion of the Umatilla County Pioneers' Association at Weston, June 2 and 3 were made Wednesday afternoon at a meeting of the general committee.

Everything indicates the success of the reunion. An excellent program has been prepared, and there will be several features of especial interest. Weston will be in gala attire and will endeavor to hospitably entertain its visitors. In accordance with the annual custom of residents, private lawns about town will be thrown open for the accommodation of picnickers.

The exercises will be held in a commodious pavilion on Broad street, fronting on Main, conveniently arranged and gaily decorated. The pavilion will be of canvas, 45x100 feet in dimensions, with an annex for the platform 21x32 feet.

Dan C. Kirk was appointed marshal of the day and empowered to appoint a sufficient number of aides to preserve order during the occasion. Happily the crowds attending these annual events at Weston have always been well disposed and peaceable, and the officers will doubtless have little to do.

from the society. Charles Kimball, the deceased husband, died at Alba November 26, 1903, six months after the date he was received into the lodge. He was a well known citizen of the Camas Prairie country and was highly respected. The complaint was filed in the office of County Clerk Saling early yesterday afternoon.
