

## HENEY ON MITCHELL

### THE SELFISHNESS OF THE SENATOR STRONGLY DENOUNCED

#### "He Calls It Persecution; We Call It Vindication of the Laws of the Country."

Senator Mitchell was never arraigned in severer language than District Attorney Heney used in finishing his summary of the government's evidence Wednesday afternoon at the federal court, says the Journal. Words were not minced and there was no equivocation of meaning. The government's attorney told the jury why he believed the venerable senator at the bar to be one of the most consummate masters of selfishness. The statements developed in connection with a review of Robertson's testimony. Returning the defendant's accusations against the government, the district attorney said:

"He calls it persecution; we call it vindication of the laws of this country. We call it performance of duty. They call us scoundrels and other things for performing our duty."

Again in a burst of oratory, the district attorney said:

"It is not a disgrace to have one the Oregon United States senators convicted of a crime, but it is a disgrace to the state of Oregon if its citizenship has fallen so low that a jury can be found in the state who will say that we will not enforce the law because we and the rest of our citizens have placed the one who has violated the law in high office. If you have one in high office who has committed a crime, that is ten thousand times more reason why you should enforce the law and let him and every other man understand that whom you honor in Oregon in the future is not above the law."

Again: "Here is the selfishness of this man, who would not only have old age perjure itself to save him, but would reach out to this young man, Robertson, whom he had raised in his office, under his eyes, and unhesitatingly sacrifice him by having him commit perjury that he might go free."

"He lets Tanner sweat here and lets Tanner make the sacrifice and does not even read his telegram to Robertson until Robertson is subpoenaed. It matters not to him who is sacrificed, so long as he can go free."

"He denounces Tanner and Robertson as conspirators, because they would not perjure themselves, and stay perjured, to save this defendant. So this selfish defendant considered any man. His friends were only those who would commit perjury and stay perjured."

#### Centennial Notes.

The attendance at the Lewis and Clark Exposition on June 24, G. A. R. day, was 15,673. There were about 3000 veterans present, and appropriate exercises were held.

Last Saturday, Seattle day, was one of the biggest days at the Lewis and Clark fair. The Northern metropolis sent several hundred citizens to attend the exercises.

For the purpose of stimulating night attendance at the fair the management has devised a coupon arrangement which will enable the purchaser of a fifty-cent admission ticket to take in twenty-five cents worth of shows on the Trail free of charge.

Saturday, July 1, is Tacoma day at the fair, and a big delegation of Tacoma boosters will attend the fair that day. Tacoma has been very hot in evidence ever since the opening of the exposition, by reason its catchy motto, "Watch Tacoma Grow."

Rabbi Emil G. Hirsch, of Chicago, probably the most distinguished rabbi in America, will preach in the Auditorium at the fair on Sunday, July 2. Sunday services at the exposition are held at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. The gates are opened at noon and the Sunday admission has been reduced to 25 cents. The Trail shows are not permitted to run on Sundays.

Trail day, when the amusement street of the exposition is to be dedicated, has been postponed one week, from June 24 to July 1. The change was made in order to allow several shows, which were established on the shore of Guild's Lake after the Trail had outgrown its original quarters on the bridge, to get ready for the opening. On Trail day there will be speeches and a big parade.

The biggest patriotic celebration ever held in the west will be that at the Lewis and Clark exposition on the Fourth of July. The commercial organizations of the city and the management of the exposition will cooperate in making the celebration an uproarious success. In the evening there will be elaborate pyrotechnic displays on Guild's Lake, and Mount Hood will be illuminated by the use of a great quantity of red fire.

One of the notable visitors at the Lewis and Clark fair last week was W. R. Shannon of Fowler, Cal., who is the son of George Shannon, the youngest member of the Lewis and Clark exploring party of a hundred years ago. George Shannon was known as "the boy Shannon, on account of his youth. After the expedition he became a lawyer, and was

a distinguished jurist in Missouri. His son, the exposition visitor, is now 80 years of age. He remembers hearing his father tell thrilling tales about his experience on the long journey from St. Louis to the mouth of the Columbia, which the fair at Portland is commemorating.

#### Metcalf Balks.

Secretary Metcalf of the department of commerce and labor will, it is asserted, throw up his job as a cabinet officer when the summer wanes, because of the summary directions given him by the president to issue orders to his subordinates to deal leniently with the Chinese. It is asserted that Metcalf did not issue the order without showing the president plainly that he did not wish to do so because he felt the situation one that should be dealt with in another way. Metcalf comes from California and is in favor of Chinese exclusion. He probably is the best equipped man in the cabinet to talk on the subject. Secretary Taft, to whom the question was referred for quasi administrative advice, took the position that Metcalf being a Californian was prejudiced against the Chinese beyond the point where advice would be accepted as safe and sane.
