THE SELFISHNESS OF THE SEN-ATOR STRONGLY DENOUNCED

"He Calls It Persecution; We Call It Vindication of the Laws of

the Country."

Senator Mitchell was never arraigned in severer language than District Attorney Heney used in finishing his summary of the government's evidence Wednesday afternoon at the federal court, says the Journal. Words were not minced and there was no equivocation of meaning. The government's attorney told the jury why he believed the venerable senator at the bar to be one of the most consummate masters of selfishness. The statements developed in connection with a review of Robertson's testimony. Returning the defendant's accusations against the government, the district attorney said:

"He calls it persecution; we call it vindication of the laws of this county. We call it performance of duty. They call us scoundrels and other things for performing our duty."

Again in a burst of oratory, the district attorney said:

"It is not a disgrace to have one the Oregon United States senators convictthe state of Oregon if its citizenship fare, amounting to \$9.90. has fallen so low that a jury can be one in high office who has committed a crime, that is ten thousand times more reason why you should enforce the law and let him and every other man understand that whom you honor in Oregon in the future is not above the law."

Again: "Here is the selfishness of this man, who would not only have old age perjure itself to save him, but would reach out to this young man, Robertson, whom he had raised in his office, under his eyes, and unhesitatingly sacrifice him by having him commit perjury that he might go free.

"He lets Tanner sweat here and lets Tanner make the sacrifice and does not even read his telegram to Robertson until Robertson is subpoenaed. It matters not to him who is sacrificed, so long as he can go free.

"He denounces Tanner and Robertson as conspirators, because they would not perjure themselves, and stay perjured, to save this defendant. So this selfish defendant considered any man. His friends were only those who would commit perjury and stay perjured."
