

IGORROTS AT FAIR

**FIFTY BONTOC HEAD-HUNTERS
NOW ON THE WAY.**

**They Are Imported For Exhibition
Purposes By Special Permission
of Governor Wright.**

Portland, July 13.—By the 1st of August fifty Bontoc Igorrotes will reach Portland, to build a village at the Lewis and Clark Exposition and remain as a living ethnological exhibit during the fair. For a time it seemed that Portland was not going to have this interesting feature, but after much hard work on the part of those interested in the enterprise the consent of Uncle Sam was secured and the Igorrotes were collected and put aboard ship at Manila. It was necessary to obtain the consent of Secretary Taft and Governor Luke E. Wright, of the Philippine Islands, before the natives could be procured. The government gave its consent for the head-hunters to come to America only after receiving rigid assurance that they would be returned to their homes. At the Portland fair these people of limited apparel will do their peculiar dances, eat dog, smoke cigarettes and otherwise add to the gaiety of the exposition. Their village will be located near the Homer Davenport bird and animal farm. As this will be the first time any of these interesting wards of the nation have been on exhibition in the Pacific West, it is expected that they will attract much attention.

Centennial Notes.

Somebody has unearthed from the files of the Scientific American this little item, of present interest, which was printed in the issue of September 2, 1863: "In cutting some timber in Omaha a few days since, a bullet was found imbedded in the trunk of a rock elm. The grains which had overgrown it show that it must have been deposited there sixty-two years ago, a time when the country had not yet been visited by any white men, except the explorers, Lewis and Clark."

The skull and horns of a Rocky Mountain sheep were found some time ago by an Idaho man, firmly imbedded twenty feet from the ground in the trunk of a large tree. The section containing the curiosity has been taken to the Lewis and Clark Exposition where it is attracting much attention. It is presumed that when the tree was a sapling the sheep got entangled in its branches and died. As the sapling grew into a tree, the sheep was lifted upward and its skull and horns became imbedded in the trunk.

Heliograph signals are now being flashed from the snow line of Mt. Hood to a station near the Government buildings on the Lewis and Clark Exposition grounds, seventy miles distant. A squad of United States troops in command of a lieutenant has established a signal station near the summit of the grand old peak and the exposition is in daily communication with the mountain. Several parties of adventurous people will climb to the summit of Mt. Hood during the summer as a sort of side trip from Portland the exposition city.

The Fourth of July attendance at the exposition was 53,708. This is at least 30 per cent. more than the most sanguine of the officials expected. It beats the Fourth of July attendance at the Omaha exposition by nearly 10,000 and is 14,131 higher than the attendance on the opening day at Portland, June 1. Up to July 4 half a million admissions had been recorded in the thirty-four days of the big fair. This aggregate is far above expectations. The attendance is increasing daily, and all indications point to a total that will break every exposition record, considering the neighboring population. The Fair will run until October 15.

FEW LICENCES ISSUED.

**Hunters Are Slow In Securing Permits
to Kill Game.**

Up to the present time but fifteen hunters' licenses have been issued by County Clerk Saling, though it has been several weeks since the law became operative regarding this feature of the game laws, says the Tribune. Deputy Game and Fish Warden Joe Nolf states that all hunters must be armed with the necessary credentials before they will be permitted to hunt wild game and unless the new law is complied with he will prosecute all offenders.

The open season for buck deer begins August 15, and for does, September 1. On August 15 it shall be lawful to kill grouse and prairie chickens, provided the huntsman is of course properly licensed. The charge of the hunter's license for persons residing in Oregon is \$1.

HENEY RESTS CASE

Mass of Documentary Evidence Introduced by Government.

The introduction of a mass of documentary evidence and identification of it by the witnesses consumed all of Wednesday in the Williamson-Gessner-Biggs trial, at the conclusion of which Henev announced that the government rested its case.

The documents introduced consisted of entries of public land which the

government contends were for the benefit of the firm of Williamson & Gessner, and relinquishments of claims filed just prior to the time the indictments against Williamson, Gessner and Biggs were returned, and letters of Marion Biggs relative to entries or relinquishment of public lands. The defense began its examination of witnesses yesterday.
