KEES IS VINDICATED

NOTHING FOUND TO SUSTAIN ACCUSATIONS MADE.

Board Completes Work and Final Decision Will Be Made in Olympia Soon.

Walla Walla, Nov. 2.—The investigation of the affairs at the state penitentiary by the state board of control upon the recommendation of Governor Mead closed yesterday and the consensus of opinion is that Warden Kees has been fully vindicated of each and every charge in the complaint. Those who heard the evidence from beginning to end are a unit in the opinion that the warden's political enemies made a dismal and utter failure. Several of the charges were dismissed by the board during the trial and those in charge of the prosecution practically abandoned every allegation except the one in relation to the alleged illegal registration of the penitentiary guards last spring. On this point they also failed to produce the evidence they anticipated.

The board of control adjourned shortly after noon and announced that they would convene again within a few days in Olympia and go over the transcript of the evidence and announce their findings within a short time.

Aside from the illegal registration the only charge referred to yesterday, was that of the warden's responsibility for the typhoid fever epidemic at the penitentiary this year. In order to verify the reports sent to the board of control for the months of May and June Dr. Y. C. Blalock, former physician at the pen, was recalled. He stated he thought it was not his duty to take the matter up with the board and for that reason had said nothing regarding his fears of an epidemic in his monthly reports.

GETS TWO YEARS.

Girl Horse Thief Boasted of Her Reckless Deed.

Myrtle Tipton, the sixteen year old girl horse thief who spent last Sunday night in the Walla Walla county jail, will soon arrive in the city again, says the Walla Walla Union, but she will the next time be in charge of the travelling guards of the penitentiary

and will begin the serving of a two year sentence imposed yesterday by the superior court of Whitman county.

The crime for which she will serve time is for bringing stolen property into the state, consisting of three head of horses, a hack and harness, which she stole from some Indians of the Coeur d'Alene reservation on or about the 10th of October, and disposed of them to a liveryman in St. John for \$225. While in the Walla Walla county jail she acknowledged the crime and also plead guilty in the superior court of Whitman county when returned there on Monday. She refused to have an attorney, and boasted that she was too old to send to the reform school.

Jed Blair, Miner.

Jed A. Blair, an old pioneer of the northwest, died Tuesday night of heart failure at his home in Baker City. Jed Blair was born in Vermont November 29, 1833. His parents moved to Illinois when he was still a child and he lived in that state until he was 19, when he crossed the plains to California. After spending many years prospecting in different parts of the west he finally discovered a placer mine in Mormon Basin, near Baker City, in 1863. He lived there until last year, when he sold his mine to a friend for \$75,000 and moved to Baker City, where he lived until his death.

Cannot Break a Contract.

The Washington state school superintendent has forwarded to all school superintendents a decision of his office in which he sustains the revocation of a certificate of a teacher because the latter did not comply with her contract. The case in point was that of Miss Anna Haunehohl, a teacher who had contracted to teach a nine months' term in a district in Snohomish county, and after teaching for a short time abandoned the school. The inference to be drawn is that a teacher who abandons one school after the contract is signed for a place of higher salary stands an excellent chance of losing his certificate.

Enforcing the Game Law.

State Game Warden J. W. Baker is at Baker City to give his personal supervision to the prosecution of a few men for selling ducks this fall. The new license law has brought in about \$12,000 already this year, and the law will be closely enforced. The new law provides that ducks and game birds cannot be sold during any season of the year, but a few dealers were not acquainted with this new law and flooded the market until the deputy game warden stopped them.

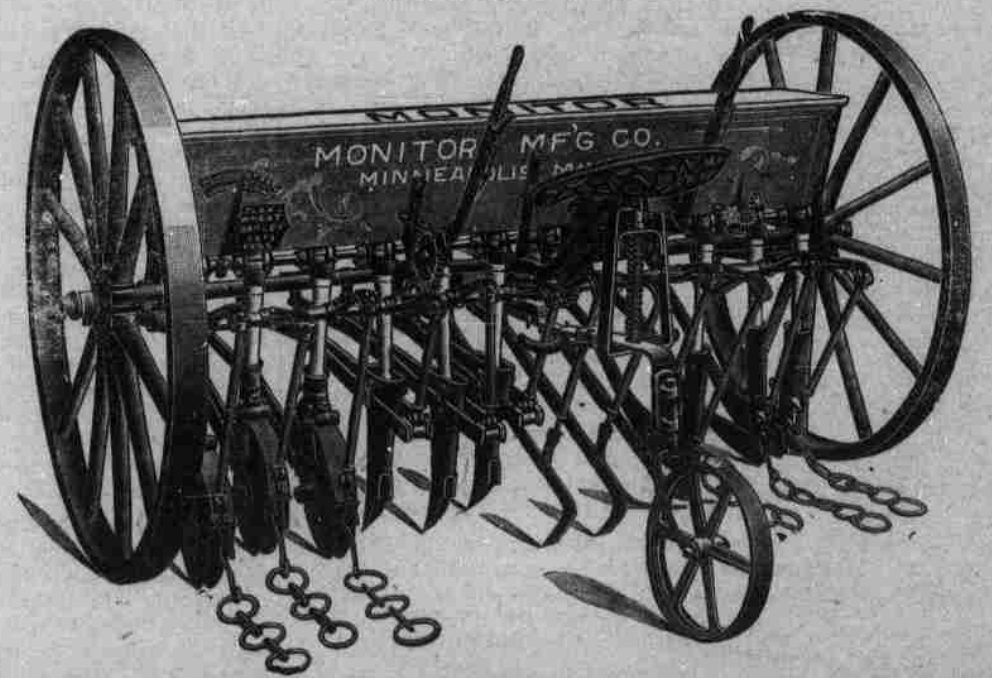
