Tuesday night fire destroyed the O. R. & N. round house at Umatilla. The property loss is considerable, and includes the destruction of six new passenger engines.

Milton Eagle, Miss Elsa Rosenzweig of Athena, who has been the guest of Miss Jennie Dykes for several days, departed Tuesday for her home in Franklin county, Wash., where she will spend the summer.

J. F. Zerba was seriously injured yesterday while engaged in operating a lever on his plow. In releasing the lever it flew up with much force, striking him in the side. On examination Dr. Sharp found two broken ribs.

The next games between the Walla Walla "Boosters" and the Yellow Kids will be on the Athena grounds, Saturday and Sunday, April 27 and 28. The teams are very evenly matched and close, hard games are looked for.

Mr. Ligo Haligus, Mrs. J. F. Haligus and Mrs. Doc Booher, all of Clarkston, Wash., after visiting relatives and friends in this city for a couple of days, left this morning over the W. & C. R. for Mabton, Wash., where the parents of the ladies reside.

Marshal Gholson gave his watch a bath this morning. While flushing out the gutters on Main street the watch dropped from his pocket into the water and after some time spent in hunting it was located near the entrance to the culvert at the intersection of Third and Main.

Among the real estate transfers reported this week are A. L. Jones of Athena to A. B. McEwen, of the same place, for \$700, lot 10, block 9, in Athena. Leah Mansfield to Elizabeth Jones, both of Athena, for \$500, lot 11, block 9, in the city of Athena.

The jury in the case of Allen H. Reynolds against Percy C. Holland, manager of the Statesman Publishing company at Walla Walla, after being out all night returned a verdict in the morning in favor of the defendant. Reynolds sued Holland for libel, placing damages at \$35,000.

Sanford Stone, keeper of the station, Star of Kansas, owned by A. B. McEwen, was seriously injured by the horse while traveling along the road the other day. The horse was being led behind a cart, and attacked Mr. Stone from behind, suddenly and

without warning of any kind. The massive jaws closed on Stone's right arm just above the elbow, and the hold was gradually shifted to the shoulder of the helpless man. Mr. Stone was absolutely powerless to offer any defense, and after going some distance was pulled from the cart to the ground. At this time the horse loosed his hold, jumped back and scampered away. He was later captured by the keeper. Mr. Stone's arm and shoulder is terribly bruised and the horse is being taken care of by another man.

The East Oregonian reports what is alleged to be an attempt to introduce a fraudulent will into the private papers belonging to the estate of J. W. Young, of Weston, was made by Mrs. Mabel Warner, a niece of Young, who was raised in the Young family, in the bank of Weston Wednesday afternoon. While looking over the papers Mr. Warner is said to have introduced a will giving her the bulk of the property among the papers, but was detected by Mr. Hall, who was closely watching the examination of the papers.

Some days ago Bert Cartano resigned as manager of the ball team, because of business duties. In his place the board of directors have selected Bruce Wallace, who is now manager of the team. Mr. Wallace is a well known business man, an ex-ball player, and knows all requirements expected of a first class ball team. All were sorry that Mr. Cartano was compelled to give up the management but in Mr. Wallace the ball team has a good man to look after its interests.

That there is a scarcity of men for ranch work is declared by J. C. Spoonmore, the employment agent of Pendleton. According to Mr. Spoonmore, he has been unable to secure men for several farmers who have applied to him recently. The men have been wanted mainly for plowing, though some are needed for other work. In some instances \$1.25 per day has been paid, whereas the usual rate has been \$90 per month.

Four persons, formerly residents of this city, were in the California earthquake. C. W. Hollis and family reside in Oakland, Reed Hill is at San Jose, Mrs. Fleming, formerly Mrs. W. H. Hawes is in Santa Rosa, and also Mrs. Dr. G. W. King formerly lived there but it is not known whether she is there at present or not. Various Athena people have friends in the stricken district.

W. D. Chamberlain of this city has become a candidate for joint representative between Umatilla and Morrow county, and today will be voted for in the democratic primary election. Mr. Chamberlain has served two terms as county clerk and one term as representative in the Oregon legislature.

Tuesday Mrs. William McBride celebrated the anniversary of her birth by inviting to her home all the ladies who took part in the "Milkmaids' convention" which took place some weeks ago. Refreshments were served and the afternoon passed socially. Mrs. McBride was presented with a beautiful picture by the guests.

The largest real estate deal to take place in this county for years was consummated Wednesday, when the G. W. Hunt ranch, near Foster, was sold to the Union Stockyards company of Troutdale for \$175,000. William Dougherty, president of the stockyard company, took possession as soon as the deed was signed up.

Jim Narcisse, a Umatilla Indian, was found dead near Cayuse Station yesterday morning, the indications being that he committed suicide. He had been drunk the day before at Adams. Last year he tried to shoot himself while with a fishing party near Weiser, Idaho. However, he failed in the attempt.
