Interment will take place in the Athena cemetery, the time of holding the funeral is not yet announced.

The machine men of Eureka flat district have settled on the following prices for labor in the harvest fields: Forkers, per day, \$3; header punchers, \$3.50; hoe-downs, \$2.50; separator men, \$5; engineers, \$5; spike pitchers \$2.50; loaders, \$2.50. The prices for threshing in that district will be 7 cents per bushel for clean grain and 8 for foul. There is a scarcity of good men for the harvest fields. Harvesting will commence by the 10th inst.

We have heard of men being kicked by horses, mules and cows, but seldom if ever does a newspaper have the opportunity to chronicle the event where a man is kicked by a hen.
