

INSURANCE CHANGED

United Workmen Will Issue
Certificate for \$500.

MARSHFIELD WOMAN IS CHIEF

Committee From Grand Lodge Attends
Morning Session of the De-
gree of Honor.

After October 1 of this year, certificates of insurance will be issued by the Ancient Order of United Workmen for \$500, as the result of a decision reached Wednesday morning at the session of the grand lodge which is being held in Portland. Heretofore certificates were not issued for sums less than \$1000. The certificates to be issued to the new members after that date will be only according to the specifications of the level rate plan that was agreed upon at the special session last year. The action, however, will not affect old policies now in force.

The departure of the insurance department of the order in lowering the amounts of the policies was incorporated in a law that was adopted by the grand lodge.

With reference to the official paper of the order the matter was referred to the trustees with instructions to renew the contract with the publisher at the same rate that has prevailed. Another feature of the session was the conferring of the degree of Past Grand Master upon D. David Walker of Portland.

The election of officers of the Degree of Honor, which was to have been a special order at Wednesday morning's session was postponed till late in the afternoon. Mrs. Hattie E. McCormick of Marshfield, grand lady of honor, was slated to be promoted to the position of grand chief of honor, according to the custom of the order.

At the morning session, Supreme Master William Narvis of Iowa and Past Grand Masters Werlein, Durham and Smith of the grand lodge of the A. O. U. W. were introduced and addressed the women. The supreme master made an eloquent and complimentary speech in appreciation of the high standard of work being done by the Degrees of Honor of Oregon and throughout the superior jurisdiction. Response was made by Past Grand Chief of Honor Margaret Herrin, who said she had been a member for ten years and her faith in the order has never faltered.

"Whoever expresses a thought," she said, "that relieves distress or makes others happier or better has done a mighty deed. When John Upchurch expressed the thought of fraternal protection he planted a seed from which sprang not a feeble plant, but many forest giants which have spread their shades over the whole world. Notwithstanding the troubled waters, the great ship of our fraternity is passing through the order cannot fail, for it was born of God-given inspiration to render help to a fellow being in sickness, sorrow and distress."

Mrs. Minnie DePeatt was the delegate from Clover Leaf Lodge Degree of Honor, and J. S. Henry was the delegate from the Athena Lodge, A. O. U. W.

PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, there has been submitted to the electors of the State at the last general election as required by law an initiative petition for a proposed amendment to Section 1 of article XII of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, to allow the state printing, binding and printer's compensation to be regulated by law at any time, and

Whereas, on the 25th day of June, 1906, the Secretary of State in my presence as Governor of the State of Oregon did canvass the voters given for and against said proposed amendment, and

Whereas, it was ascertained and determined upon such canvass that there were 63,749 votes cast for said proposed amendment to the Constitution, and 9,571 votes cast against the same, and that said proposed amendment received an affirmative majority of the total number of effective votes cast thereon and entitled to be counted under the provision of law,

Now, Therefore, I, George E. Chamberlain, as Governor of the State of Oregon, in obedience to and by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by law, do hereby make and issue this proclamation to the people of the State of Oregon and do announce and declare that the whole number of votes cast in the State of Oregon at said election for and against said proposed amendment was as hereinbefore stated, and that said proposed amendment received an affirmative majority of the total number of votes cast thereon and entitled to be counted under provisions of law, and that said amendment hereinbefore mentioned shall and is in full force and effect as a part of the Constitution of the State of Oregon from the date of this proclamation.

Done at the Capitol this 25th day of June, A. D. 1906.
