MR. EVANS ADVISES SPRAYING

Fruit Inspector Recommends Formula of Kerosene Emulsion.

Fruit Inspector Howard Evans, who was in the city a few days ago, had his attention called to the scale pest, which for the last three or four seasons has been inflicting the shade trees and shrubbery in Athena. He took with him specimens of the scale, and yesterday the following communication was received at this office:

Milton, Aug. 6.—To the Editor:—The shade trees I examined in your city are infested with what is known as the Hemispherical scale. It is a widely distributed insect and works upon a considerable range of plants. I would advise you use, or spray with either whale oil soap solution or kerosene emulsion. Spraying should be done at once, as the young are just issuing."

"Howard Evans."
Kerosene Emulsion.
Kerosene 2 gallons.
Whale oil or hard soap 1 pound.
Water 30 gallons.
Boil soap in two gal. water, add kerosene, agitate until mixture assumes the consistency of cream. Dilute with 30 gallons of water and the emulsion is ready for use.

BOYS LOST AT BIG MEADOWS

Sons of Gilbert Konizeski Leave Camp Sunday and Fail to Return.

Walla Walla, Aug. 6.—Two sons of Gilbert Konizeski are reported to be lost in the Blue mountains near the Big Meadows and up to a late hour this afternoon no trace of the boys had been found. The boys who are about 10 and 18 years of age, started out from camp yesterday afternoon with a 22 calibre rifle. They intended to go for a hunt, expecting to be back at the camp sometime early in the evening. As night came on, no signs of the boys were found and a large bonfire was built and several parties who knew of the boys being lost, joined in the search. A radius of possibly two miles was thoroughly gone over and no trace of the lost was found. Charles DeMoss, who came from the camp this morning, states that at 3:30 nothing had been heard from the father, who had left this city to assist in the search.

A theory is advanced that one of the boys may have been injured and that the brother is watching over him. Big Meadows is several miles from the telephone line and nothing will be learned until someone comes down from the camp.
