East Oregonian: Mrs. Mabel King Warner, niece and for a time the step-daughter of the late J. W. Young of Weston, and who has manifested a strong desire for the property contained in his estate, has been charged with the crime of forging a will and a warrant for her arrest was placed

in the hands of Sheriff Taylor. Mrs. Warner and her husband were placed under \$750 bonds, and Frank Curran and Thomas Thompson of Pendleton became sureties for the same. The two were then released from custody.

The Pendleton Tribune states that County Fruit Inspector Howard Evans yesterday seized a wagon load of infected fruit and burned it in the suburbs of that city. Mr. Evans says that a packing house at Milton is selling culls and infected fruit to peddlers at one cent per pound and that these peddlers take it to Pendleton and dispose of it to merchants. The fine provided by the law for the offering for sale of any infected fruit is from \$50 to \$100 and Mr. Evans declares that this fine will be imposed should the offense again occur. He says the peddler whose fruit he destroyed shall be fully reimbursed by the packing house.

Last night in Adams a robbery was committed in the Murray saloon. The building was entered and the till was broken open. Five dollars in money and a pistol was taken. Marshal Gholson of this city was notified that a negro was suspected of the crime and he will keep a sharp lookout for the culprit. A posse is said to be out in pursuit of the man.

Injured in Runaway.

Yesterday while driving from Weston Mountain, in company with Beryl Kidwell, of Walla Walla, W. J. Wilkinson met with an accident which resulted in a broken leg, and he now lies in Dr. Casahat's hospital at Weston. Mr. Kidwell, who is a well known stockman of the garden city, came over in this vicinity to purchase cattle, and Mr. Wilkinson had taken him to the mountain for that purpose. While driving home in the afternoon on the road east of Weston, the two men met some Indians, who when passing the rig whipped up their ponies, frightening the team. One of them rearing back, broke the double tree, thus allowing them freedom to run, which they did. The occupants seeing their danger in remaining seated, leaped from the buggy. Mr. Wilkinson breaking his leg below the knee. Both bones were fractured.

### PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, there has been submitted to the electors of the State at the last general election as required by law an initiative petition for a proposed amendment to Section 1 of article XII of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, to allow the state printing, binding and printer's compensation to be regulated by law at any time, and

Whereas, on the 25th day of June, 1906, the Secretary of State in my presence as Governor of the State of Oregon did canvass the voters given for and against said proposed amendment, and

Whereas, it was ascertained and determined upon such canvass that there were 63,749 votes cast for said proposed amendment to the Constitution, and 9,571 votes cast against the same, and that said proposed amendment received an affirmative majority of the total number of effective votes cast thereon and entitled to be counted under the provision of law,

Now, Therefore, I, George E. Chamberlain, as Governor of the State of Oregon, in obedience to and by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by law, do hereby make and issue this proclamation to the people of the State of Oregon and do announce and declare that the whole number of votes cast in the State of Oregon at said election for and against said proposed amendment was as hereinbefore stated, and that said proposed amendment received an affirmative majority of the total number of votes cast thereon and entitled to be counted under provisions of law, and that said amendment hereinbefore mentioned shall and is in full force and effect as a part of the Constitution of the State of Oregon from the date of this proclamation.

Done at the Capitol this 25th day of June, A. D. 1906.
