The men became involved in an altercation at Wallula, both having been drinking. A fight took place and Moorehead was struck. The dead man was a well known farmer near Wallula.

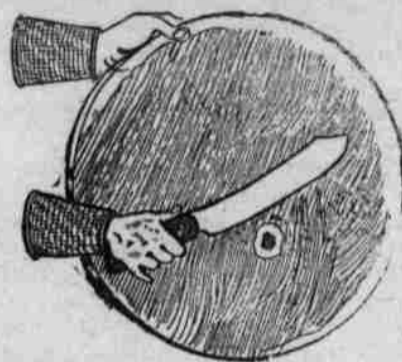
