

NIGGARDLY POLICY

Comparison Made of School Maintenance in States of Oregon and Washington.

Reflecting on the niggardly policy Oregon pursues on her maintenance of state educational institutions, the Walla Walla Union draws the following vivid comparison, editorially:

"The last Oregon legislature appropriated \$125,000 for the maintenance of the state university at Eugene, and a referendum has been called on the appropriation, thus tying up the funds of the university until after the June election. Heretofore the largest appropriation ever made for the Oregon university was \$47,500. Even the larger sum seems ridiculously small in the state of Washington, where the appropriation for the state university at Seattle averages about \$350,000, and at the last session of the legislature was only a little short of one million, if we count the appropriation for new buildings in conjunction with the Lake Washington shore lands given to the Alaska-Yukon exposition first and then the usufruct to the university.

"It is no wonder that Oregon is looked upon as a mossback state and it is so far behind Washington in the development of its equally rich resources when such niggardly tactics are used in dealing with state educational institutions. If the referendum results in the defeat of the \$125,000 appropriation, it will have the effect of calling a halt to the effort being made in several states to adopt the Oregon plan of direct legislation. The Washington state university would have been closed long ago if it had been forced to subsist on a pittance of \$47,500 a year, and even \$125,000 would have barely kept the institution alive. If Oregon would attract the best class of immigrants from the eastern states it should adopt a more liberal policy toward its educational institutions. It is to be hoped for the good name of the state that the people will vote overwhelmingly next June for the larger appropriation."

A SOUL WINNING MINISTRY IN FOUR PARTS.

Part First.

To the thoughtful, God and man-loving student of present day conditions this is a most serious subject. The impression, has some way gained footing, with some well meaning laymen, as well as ministers, that all ministers are not called to be soul-winners. Man-made are not, but God-called, are, if His glory to first sought; but not necessarily in all places, for unbelief, as in Matt. 13, 58 and other causes prevail often, so the work is greatly hindered, but there are few cases of this kind.

Some assert boldly and with dignity air, their peculiar gift is to build fine edifices, others to secure large funds for benevolences, others to move men by eloquence and long lectures, and still others have ambition to be great preachers, the abuse of which ambition has held to many sorts of literary tricks; so they often have as much to say about Socrates, or Tenyson, or Bill Nye as Jesus Christ. Christ in choosing his Apostles, left us an example for all men and forever, which honest and intelligent investigation cannot mistake and proves beyond question that when He calls men to be fishers of other men He turns each and all peculiar gifts to count in winning them from sin. Can it truthfully be said that any whom He called were not called to bring the sinful world to God? Most certainly not. But look, especially, at Mathew the business man, Peter the cursing fisherman, who, with the other original eleven was unlearned, and Paul the scholar.

Were they not all soul-winners, and soul-winners always, while on earth? True, "The perfecting of the saints" is very essential, but the birth precedes the training and, as it looks to me, is the first and chief consideration of every minister: Neither does the Word show that one set of ministers won and another set trained, but rather that they who won also trained, or taught in the greater things of the Word and experienced, those who, under their labors had been won to Christ. Indeed, is not this the most reasonable and natural, as well as the most Scriptural thing that could be expected? Most certainly it is.

Methods may be unlike. Paul preached with mighty power all night, thundered the awful judgments of God in the ears of Felix until the haughty Procurator trembled, spake with such eloquent, personal appeal before Festus and Agrippa that the former said, with a loud voice, "thou art beside thyself; much learnest thou make thee mad," and the latter, "almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian." John said, with a loving heart, "Little children love one another." But both were soul-winners. Before ordination, to preach Christ's holy Gospel, is conferred the winning of some to Him must be proven: See Dis. P. 79, Par. 103. That a man says he is called of God to preach is not always enough: The church requires that the fact be established by actual demonstration.

And yet, notwithstanding all this, and the additional facts as well, that our modern, as well as our ancient fathers, in Christ, were soul-winners, many present day preachers, in other denominations as well as our own, both privately and publicly and apparently indifferently, declare, not

only that they were not called to win souls, but deary evangelistic work in any form, even criticizing the methods of others who are winning thousands to Christ every year.

As the very object of the sacrifice and death of Christ was that sinners might be won to Him, it is a ponderous puzzle to me how men can be true ministers of his and yet win no other men to Him.

The first and greatest work of a minister is soul-winning, and if he is God-called, and is true to his calling, he will, by "The law of the Spirit of Life" in him, as willingly and anxiously do that work (and very much more so) as a man will seek his lost neighbor in the distant, lonely, dark, dangerous, cold solitude of the mountains.

If a preacher has eaten Bread in the Kingdom of God his first, londest, longest, and most yearning cry will be, "O taste and see that the Lord is good." I find, in the Word, no special gifts, or callings, for rhetorical, or artificial eloquence; long lectures, raising money, becoming popular orators, &c; but I do find them for winning souls: Please read Isa. 1, 21, 5: 19; Acts 1, 4: 8; 2, 1-4: 1 Cor. 12, 7: 14, 4: 1; John 14, 16-17; 16, 7-14: Phil. 3, 7-8; Psa. 51, 1-13.

Christ's first command with a promise, Matt. 4, 19, was, "Follow Me and I will make you fishers of men," and His last command Mark 16, 15, to "Go into all the World and preach the Gospel to every creature." is only an expansion of the first.

Soul-winning is to Christianity what the alphabet is to reading. As well try to write books without letters as to build the true Church of Christ without soul-winning. The non-soul-winning minister, I have observed, often sympathizes with, openly favors and sometimes frequents questionable places of amusement, as theaters, balls, circuses, card and wine parties, tin horn shows traveling through the land &c., believes quite largely in present day higher criticism of God's Holy Word, has a theology impregnated, more or less, with the noxious odors of agnosticism, idealism, materialism, ritualism, etc., which easily and clearly explains the reason why he is not used of God in winning souls from sin.

It is because such a course of study, belief and practice offends God, ill regards his Son, grieves the Holy Spirit, dulls the conscience, chills the heart, crowds the mind with worldly and Christless thoughts until he becomes unfruitful as the barren fig tree with nothing but leaves.
