

THE PETITIONS FILED

County Clerk Has List of Republican and Democratic Aspirants to Political Offices.

Wednesday was the day for the filing of candidates' petitions with the county clerk, as required by law, so that their names may appear on the party ballots when the primaries are held.

It is believed by Clerk Saling, says the Tribune, that the last candidate has filed his petition and that the list below is a complete one.

With the exception of sheriff there are candidates for the republican nomination to every office but in only a few instances is there to be a contest. In nearly every case the present incumbent is to be nominated for reelection without opposition.

In addition to the county officers, the republicans will be expected to choose between the two candidates for United States senator and the two for congressman.

District Attorney Phelps is to have no opposition in the primaries but it is understood, Attorney Charles H. Carter is to be an independent candidate before the people at the June election.

For representative, there are three candidates and two are to be nominated.

The number of democratic candidates is exceedingly small and in no case will there be a contest in the primaries.

Sneezes to Death.
Nels Waldahl, of Colby, Washington sneezed to death in a room at a Seattle hotel Monday morning. Before retiring, Waldahl complained of a slight cold. During the night, the manager of the house, in the next room, heard him coughing and sneezing violently. It continued and the manager entered Waldahl's room,

finding him seated on the bed and sneezing so violently that he was unable to answer questions. Finally he managed to ask for a glass of water. The manager left the room to get the water, but he had hardly stepped out of the door when the paroxysms began again. When Manager Heron returned, he found Waldahl lying on the bed, shaking violently. He died within a few minutes and without being able to drink the water Heron had brought.

GOVERNOR WILL DEPORT THEM

State Insane Asylum Is Dumping Ground for Aliens.

A wholesale deportation of foreigners now confined in the state insane asylum may follow an investigation begun by Governor Chamberlain and Superintendent Steiner about a month ago. The attention of the governor was attracted to the matter by the arrival at the institution, at the time he was making his monthly inspection, of two Swedish sailors, who could not speak a word of English. An inspection was then made of the foreigners confined and the startling fact was revealed that the majority of them had come to this country as sailors for the first time and, immediately on landing, had to be taken into custody. This made it appear to certain members of the asylum commission as if there was an attempt on the part of other nations to ship their insane to this country as sailors with the intention of unloading them onto our institutions.

The fate of three of those inmates suspected of having been thrown onto this state for support, has already been taken up with the commissioner of immigration and almost any day the necessary papers will be prepared for their deportation.

THE NORTH BANK SCHEDULE

One Daylight Train Each Way Daily From Pasco to Vancouver.

Two daylight passenger trains, Nos. 1 and 2, are now in operation on the north bank of Spokane and Seattle railroad between Pasco and Vancouver, a distance of 221 miles.

Train No. 1, the westbound, leaves Pasco at 11 a. m. every day and arrives at Vancouver at 5 p. m. Train No. 2, eastbound, leaves Vancouver at 9 a. m. daily and arrives at Pasco at 5 p. m., giving that system a daylight train service along the Columbia river, daily.

A circular announcing the opening of the line west of Lyle says that connections will be made with the Northern Pacific at Pasco and Vancouver; with the Columbia and Northern at Lyle, and with the Portland Railway, Light and Power company's suburban lines at Vancouver, thus giving the new line direct communication with Portland.

There are 44 stations on the new line between Pasco and Vancouver, as follows: Pasco, Finley, Hover, Yelpt, Tomar, Mottinger, Colbia, Plymouth, Gravel, Coolidge, Patterson, Sage, Luzon, Caley, McCredie, Mounax, Roosevelt, Sandal, Fountain, Harbin, Towal, Cliffs, Columbus, Timm, Avery, Spedia, Granddallas, Skadat, Lyle, Villa, Bingen, Hood, Cooks, Collins, Ash, Stevenson, Cascades, Butler, Cruzatta, Washogal, Camas, Fisher, Image, Vancouver.

Plymouth is the station opposite Umatilla and is being patronized largely by people from the Oregon side of the river.

BALLINGER'S LEASING LAW

Also Provides For Sale of Grazing Land to Adjoining Owners.

Land Commissioner Ballinger has drafted a bill for leasing public land to be submitted to the secretary of the interior for approval and recommendation to congress. It provides that all vacant non-mineral, non-irrigable public land not classified as coal or timber lands and not producing wild hay in merchantable quantities shall be specified as pasture lands and adjacent to patented lands under cultivation may be divided into grazing blocks not exceeding 1280 acres compact form and sold to the owners of such cultivated lands at \$1.25 an acre. Pasture land not subject to such sale shall be leased for grazing purposes at terms, manner, quantity and periods as the secretary of the interior may prescribe, the net profits to be paid to the states or territories for the support of the public schools.
