

# A STUNNING GAME TEACHERS SCARCE

Athena and Adams, Evenly Matched Played Before a Big Crowd Sunday Afternoon.

A better game of ball was played in Athena Sunday than the excursionists witnessed at Meador Park, Walla Walla. The Adams and Athena teams were evenly matched and during the whole nine innings it was anybody's game and a tossup which team would win out.

But when Captain Dudley kinked his finger at David McStove, that stalwart young Irishman toyed with a horsehoe in his pocket and stepped into the pitcher's box, and it wasn't in the cards for Adams to win. The Shamrocks gave him perfect support, and the boys from Hugh Robie's town found him for only three safe hits, one of which was a 2-bagger, stung by Dr. Fred Lienallen's wicked willow.

And the doctor pitched some ball himself. He had good control with men on bases, but he was found at opportune times for an aggregate of eight hits, four of which were of the juicy 2-station variety.

Adams was the first to score. The run was made in the third inning. Owens punched a safe one into right field and piloted second. Dr. Lienallen found one to his liking and pushed it away from him for two bases, Owens scoring.

Athena came back likewise in fourth and registered twice. Mr. O'Willaby patiently waited for four balls. His "Umps," Mr. McHawks, gave him his due and the crowd roared. Then Mr. McDudley showed a single into right garden. Benny Gross, the only Dutchman on the team gallantly pleased the fair sex when he neatly placed a 3-base hit, scoring O'Willaby and McDudley. A moment later he was nipped, trying to steal third. La-Brasche, found Lienallen for a 2-base hit but died on second, when Sanders fanned. O'Bell ended the run-getting in the fifth, when he made the circuit on a single by O'Willaby, stealing second and scoring on errors by Owens and Wilson. Morissette scored for Adams in the fifth. ### Will Wear Shackles.

Sheriff Morris of Tacoma, announced that he would give Clinton O. Gandy, the insurance man sentenced to one year in prison by Judge Snell for handcuffing his wife and keeping her a prisoner in a room, "some of his own medicine." "I am going to handcuff the man and shackle him in a cell," said the sheriff "in a manner as nearly like that in which he treated his wife as possible. It would simply be making the punishment fit the deed, and the fellow should be taught a wholesome lesson. I think there is sufficient warrant for me to handle him in about the same way as he did his wife."

### Never Rode on a Train.

George Cohoe, a rancher of Deep Creek, will leave today for his former home in Grant county, Oregon. Mr. Cohoe is 37 years old, but has never been aboard a railroad train, even to inspect the cars, says the Spokane Chronicle. When he came to this country three years ago he made the journey of 600 miles in a "prairie schooner." He planned to make the return trip in the same manner, but was finally persuaded by his wife and children to go by rail. Mr. Cohoe stated that his father has traveled extensively, both in this country and abroad, but could never induce his son to board a train, the latter claiming that the mere thought of riding in the "steam cars" made him sick.

### Farmers at Pullman.

Pullman is to have a big convention when the first convention of the Farmers' Educational and Co-operative union for the Inland Empire is held there June 15 and 16. It is expected 500 farmers will attend and committees have been appointed to find homes for the delegates and to secure reduced rates. It will be one of the largest conventions of farmers ever held in eastern Washington and will include delegates and members from 110 locals in northeastern Oregon, Washington and the panhandle of Idaho.

## TEACHERS SCARCE

In Spite of Increased Salaries Pedagogues Are Going Into Other Work.

The schools in Umatilla county are facing a famine in competent teachers for the next school year. Each district has been forced to raise its teachers' salaries, without exception, from five to ten dollars per month. Yesterday a contract was signed and registered, providing for the services of P. M. Nash in the Pilot Rock schools for the ensuing year. The new contract calls for \$85 per month.

"The members of the school board are making the increase in the salaries of the teachers simply because they are forced to do so to keep the teachers," said Supt. Frank Welles in commenting on the increases that are constantly being registered in the salaries of Umatilla county are going to lose many good teachers this year in spite of the advances. The assistant principal at Athena, and the principal at Weston both sever their connections with schools this year. Both men have better offers in other fields of activity.

"But the resignations are by no means limited to the male teachers. We are losing some of the most able teachers this year who are to become wives. That is the greatest problem, matrimony. Young women will marry in spite of the salary temptations; men will generally stay another year at least.

"The difficult part of the situation, however, is not so much that we are losing many of the teachers as that we have no way of filling the depleted ranks with qualified instructors. Good school teachers are at a premium. Hundreds of school teachers could be used to advantage in the schools of eastern Oregon next year without the slightest plethora in the staffs. Formerly there have been many teachers from the east who came west to secure the better salaries that we offered, but the eastern states have been forced to meet our offers, and the supply is out off. The daughters of the western people seem to hesitate to enter school work. For one thing, so many of them have fathers that are independent that they feel that there is little necessity for them to toil to make a living. However, many of our very best teachers are western bred and educated girls.

"Unless some unforeseen relief comes I fear that many schools in the rural districts will be forced to close their doors owing to our inability to get competent teachers. Of course, there will be no difficulty during the remainder of the present school year, although several have resigned to take effect at once. But the future looks cloudy for the small country schools, where the districts are unable to pay the salaries that teachers now demand."

### Handle the Apple Yield.

At a meeting of the Hood River Apple Growers' union held yesterday, and largely attended, a resolution was passed increasing the capital stock of the organization from \$2000 to \$25,000. The increase is for the purpose of erecting cold storage facilities to take care of the rapidly increasing apple yield of the valley. Between \$5000 and \$6000 was subscribed at the meeting within five minutes after the secretary announced that subscriptions would be received. It is the purpose of the union to build an addition to its already large warehouse there which will contain the cold storage plant.

### Pilot Rock Rural Route.

Petitions asking for the establishment of a rural mail route out of Pendleton and covering the settlements on Birch, McKay and Tutuilla creeks south have been forwarded to Congressman W. R. Ellis. The route will include about 100 patrons and will cover the same territory served by the Pendleton-Pilot Rock stage line before the completion of the Pilot Rock branch of the O. R. & N.
