Fern, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank McPherrin, was born in Taylor county, Iowa, and at the time of her death was aged 19 years, 11 months and 4 days. Besides her husband, she leaves to mourn her loss, father, mother, two sisters and four brothers.

Insane, He Leaps to Death.
James Whittington, a resident of Baker City, committed suicide by jumping from a stairway at the insane asylum. He fell about 15 feet, striking his head and shoulders upon a concrete floor. Whittington was brought to the asylum about nine months ago, after he had made several attempts at suicide at home. He was about 55 years old and leaves a wife and several children.
