Mr. Cake's advertising matter, since his nomination, does not include a declaration for Statement No. 1. Previous to his nomination in the primary election, Mr. Cake advertised in the columns of the Press to the extent of \$15. He consumed that amount of advertising space in impressing on the minds of Press readers that he was the republican champion of Statement No. 1, this being his paramount issue and the principal plank in the platform on which he stood before the people as a republican candidate for United States Senator.

The entire press of the state carried Cake's Statement No. 1 advertising matter which, together with his personal pledges, won for him the nomination over Senator Fulton. Since the primaries, the republican candidate has effaced his Statement No. 1 declaration from his cards, the general inference being that Cake used the pledge only to secure the nomination, since he has emphatically refused to "meddle with county politics," and declines to support the movement of upholding the principle of Statement No. 1, by the election of independent candidates in counties where legislative nominees refused to take the pledge. Cake merely resorts to common politics, thrusts aside the vital principle he at first contended for, and unmasked, stands for nothing but the office he is seeking. Opportunity, such as few men have, knocked at Cake's door at the commencement of this campaign. He had an open chance to lead the dominant party in this state to victory for the greatest principle that ever confronted the people of Oregon. He sacrificed this principle to satisfy his greed for office, believing the office to be his anyway, for the reason that the legislature is pledged to his confirmation, the Statement No. 2 candidates being bound to vote for the republican receiving the highest number of votes at the general election. These, with the Statement No. 1 men, irrespective of party, of course makes him United States Senator, with his election over Chamberlain. Cake in the capacity of United States Senator, shorn of this great principle, is zero as compared to Cake the victorious leader of the people of a state who are trying to out away the shackles of machine politics. But Cake is found wanting, and the Fulton forces, while patting him on the back, re-organized their forces within forty-eight hours and are oiling up the machine for the next round when Bourne's term expires. The work of the republican state convention shows it. Can Cake explain it. His lieutenant, Shepherd, tried to do so in Athena Saturday, but lost out.

Mexico seems to believe that with the Philippines the United States has all the islands it needs, for it has lately claimed Arcas Keys, Guano islands in the Gulf of Mexico, eighty miles off the coast of Yucatan. The present owners of the islands insist that they belong to the United States by right of discovery by an American in 1880. We are not likely to go to war over a guano deposit. The question of sovereignty will be settled amicably by the two governments.

Japan has proved its disposition to do its part toward solving the problem of Japanese labor in this country and Canada. The Japanese government has issued instructions to prevent emigration to the United States, Canada, Mexico and the Hawaiian Islands. This solution is practical, final and tactful, for it removes from this nation the burden of deciding how to deal with the Japanese as immigrants.

Vote for the increased appropriation for the University of Oregon. Don't brand Oregon as a "mosback" state. Vote "yes" on election day. The bill has been endorsed by all the Oregon Commercial Clubs, Teachers Associations, The State Federation of Labor and the Tax Payers League of Portland.

Support the University of Oregon appropriation bill. Vote "yes" No. 314 on June 1. Be a booster; not a knocker.

The only way to secure the principle of Statement No. 1 is to cast your vote for those candidates only, who are

pledged to Statement No. 1. Ignominious defeat should be the portion for any candidate who juggles this great principle to secure office. "Vote 'er straight," no matter to which party the Statement No. 1 man belongs. Cut all others out.

Do you believe in education? Do you want State University? If so, vote "yes" No. 314 on the official ballot on election day. The passage of this bill will increase your taxes a little more than 2 cents if you pay on \$1,000 worth of property. All progressive citizens should support the bill.

PEOPLE vs. CORPORATION.

The sweeping victory won for the state and people over the corporation that owns the Oregon City locks is as gratifying as it is unusual. It restores to the state very important and very valuable rights that it had been supposed for years had been irretrievably lost. The state, in the beginning, contributed \$200,000 to aid in the construction of the locks, reserving the right to collect 10 per cent of the annual revenues, and the further right to purchase the locks at such amount as the locks had cost the corporation. Failure of the state authorities at the proper times to collect the revenues led to the assumption by the corporation that the right to do so had lapsed. For 30 years or more it has been the general supposition that whatever rights the people of Oregon originally held in the locks had been completely lost. Tuesday's decision suddenly changes the aspect of things, and by one stroke all the rights that the people had to share in the revenue from the locks seem to be fully restored to them. The mandate is to issue from the court, ordering the corporation to pay arrearage due the state, aggregating many thousand of dollar. The state is to continue hereafter to collect 10 per cent of the annual revenue yielded by the locks. The decision gives the state immense leverage in finally achieving the cherished dream of an open Willamette, and greatly reduced freight rates. It is one of the most important public achievements ever made in behalf of the people of Oregon, and one of the most overwhelming defeats ever sustained by a corporation in Oregon.

The condition is the handiwork of Governor Chamberlain. In 1905, in a letter to the attorney-general, he expressed the belief that the state had not lost its rights in the matter of the locks, and directed that officer to bring suit to recover them. His judgment, and his standing as a public man are mightily vindicated in Tuesday's decision. What other eminent governors of the state had overlooked, what had been overlooked by all others in the state, did not escape the profound and far-seeing mind of Mr. Chamberlain. He acted with his usual wisdom and determination, and the result is most valuable rights laid by him at the feet of the people of Oregon. How eminently fitted is such a man to be sent by Oregon to do things for her people in the United States senate—Portland Journal.


