

## NOW FAMOUS CABIN

Located On McKay Creek, Entryman Sav It Served As Home for Sixty Homesteaders.

A Pendleton dispatch to the Spokesman-Review says an effort by others accused to show that William Rahe, one of the men recently indicted by the federal grand jury, located about 60 entrymen in one little cabin on the headwaters of the McKay creek, will be one of the features of the approaching land fraud trials, according to several of the Pendleton witnesses who are returning from Portland, where they were compelled to tell what they knew of the transactions in this county. Many of them were among the entrymen who say they had been made to believe the cabin mentioned was theirs and was on the land on which they had fled, whereas the land in many instances was from two to eight miles distant.

Much evidence has been taken on this point, photographs of the cabin have been made and there is no doubt but that it will figure in the trials.

According to the story of witnesses, the plan was easily worked, inasmuch as many of those filing on the unallotted Indian lands did so purely for speculative purposes and with no intention of keeping the land permanently. They therefore hired Rahe to locate them, they declare, and then employed him to build their cabins and make the other improvements considered necessary. The entrymen would then be taken out to his claim and showed the cabin, "his residence." Believing that this cabin was really on the land for which he had made a filing, the entryman now claims he could innocently swear that he had a house and improvements on his claim.

In this manner, some of the defendants allege, title was secured to hundreds of acres and immediately passed on to the men who were alleged to be engineering the proposition. These are statements which are being presented to the federal grand jury now in session by the large part of the 113 witnesses subpoenaed from Pendleton and vicinity.

In many instances entrymen located their own claims, made their own improvements and knew what they were doing and where they were, but the majority of the unallotted acres of Indian land was filed upon by men

and women of Pendleton who never saw the land on which they were filing and were never any nearer to it than the cabin which is destined to become famous before the trials are ended.

## BELIEVED DEAD, FEE LIVES

Former Pendleton Man Now at Portland, Says Machinist.

Though supposed to be dead P. H. Fee, formerly of Pendleton, is alive and well, according to James Neagle of the firm of Neagle Brothers and one of the leading machinists and blacksmiths in that city. Neagle knew Fee well for many years and he declares that while in Portland attending the rose carnival he met Fee on the street and spoke to him, despite the fact that the latter was supposed to have been drowned in Cowlitz county, Washington, about two months ago.

According to the reports of the tragedy, as made at the time it was supposed to have occurred, Fee, who was a detective, was drowned while attempting to cross the river near Ariel on a log boom. It was said that he was on the trail of a criminal and was trying to reach a logging camp, where the fellow was at work.

Though the missing man was a brother of Judge James A. Fee, former mayor of Pendleton, the latter had had a falling out with his brother, and is said to have made no effort to ascertain the truth of the report or to recover his brother's body. The latter lived in Portland, and his wife and three children are still there, the family having moved from Pendleton about five years ago. One boy makes his home with his uncle in Pendleton.

Neagle says that Fee admitted to him that he allowed the report of his drowning to be circulated and go uncontradicted for a purpose.

## TO CUT OUT A STEEP GRADE

Sumpter Valley Road Making Extensive Improvements.

The Sumpter Valley railway company has commenced one of the most important pieces of work yet contemplated by that corporation in the way of improvements, in the cutting down of the summit of Huckleberry mountain at the point where the road crosses the divide separating Powder and Burnt rivers, about six miles from Sumpter, says the Blue Mountain American.

It is the intention to reduce the elevation by several hundred feet. Steam shovels are at work and the undertaking is now in full blast. In order to reach this point trains have to pull to a height of over 600 feet in the six miles, making the grade one of the steepest in the history of railroading.

The company will, after the excavating has been completed, lay a series of tracks over the ground leveled, where empties and logging trains will be kept during the time they are not in transit.

This will avert any disaster now liable from stray cars running wild down the mountain grades. A large crew is employed and the work will last most of the summer.

## O. R. & N. COMPANY IS SUED

Martin and Riggs Ask Damages for Delay in Securing Fruit Cars.

Martin and Riggs, fruit dealers of Milton have just brought suit for damages against the O. R. & N. company because that company failed to supply cars for fruit shipments to Kansas City last fall. Under a new law passed by the last legislature a railroad company is held liable for damage caused by a delay of 10 days in supplying cars for shipments of perishable products and the Milton company claims to have been damaged by such delay on part of the O. R. & N. company.

They ask for damages to the amount of \$6316.50 and Attorney Charles H. Kahn of Boise City has filed the papers for the firm. This is one of the first suits brought in eastern Oregon under this law and will be watched with much interest by attorneys and shippers.

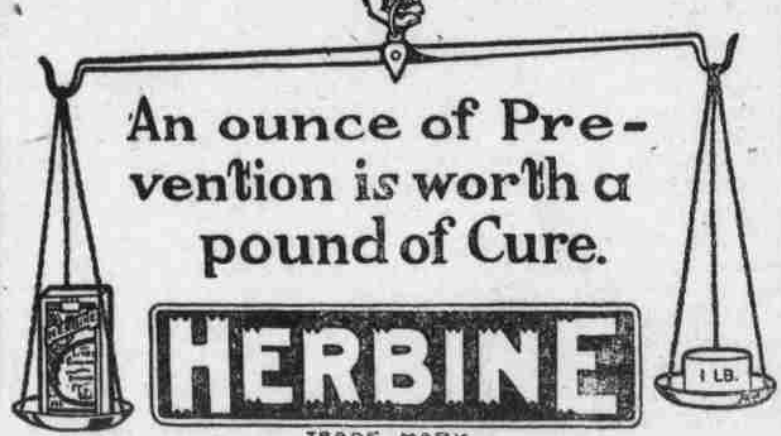

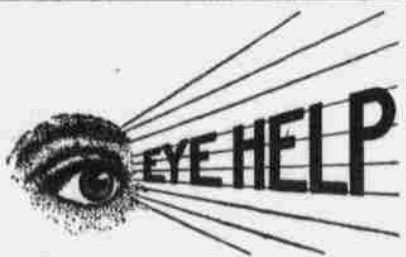
