WILL GO AGAINST PROHIBITION

Saloon Men Will Bring Suit—Prohibitionists Will Close Saloons.

That the saloon men are going to fight prohibition to the last ditch through the suit which they brought last week is the announcement made by several of them, says the Pendleton Tribune. The refusal of Judge Bean to grant them the temporary injunction as prayed for has not deterred them in their determination to fight it out, even if they have to close their doors while the question is being appealed to the supreme court.
 The main contention upon which the suit is based, outside of the constitutionality of the initiative and referendum, is that the county court was not in session at the time the order for submitting the question to the people at the June election was signed and issued. And on this point the plaintiffs contend that the official records of the minutes of the county court bear them out. This record, it is claimed, shows that the county court did not convene until May 6 in regular monthly session, having adjourned previously on April 4, whereas the order submitting the proposition to the voters was signed and issued on May 2, or four days before the county court was in session.
 While this is but a technicality yet they contend that as the prohibition law is purely statutory every step in the procedure must conform to the mandatory direction of the law, and failure in this part makes the law invalid.
 On the other hand the prohibition people say that they took great pains to see to it that everything was done as the law requires and they will provide counsel to fight the case clear through to the end, and will also see to it that the saloons close up during the time the case is being appealed.
 While the attorneys for the plaintiff do not directly say so yet it is believed that they intend to go to the United States supreme court on the constitutional question if they lose out in the state courts.
 Arguments in the case were made yesterday before Judge Bean, Attorneys Winter, Richards and Lowell appearing for the saloon men and District Attorney Phelps for the county and state.
