FIRST ANNUAL MEET

Umatilla County Schools Participate Tomorrow in Athletic Meet and Oratorical Contest.

The first annual track meet and oratorical contest to be given under the auspices of the Umatilla County Athletic and Oratorical Association, of which A. C. Hampton of Pendleton is president, A. E. Gronewold is treasurer and H. G. Case is secretary, will take place in this city tomorrow.

The athletic meet will take place in the city park, and the oratorical contest will be given at the Methodist Episcopal church, beginning at 7:30 p. m. The athletic program begins at 10 o'clock and will be preceded by a ball game between the Columbia College team and a mixed team from the Pendleton Academy, which takes place at 10 a. m. An admittance fee of 25 cents will be charged at the ball game and at the athletic meet, and also for the oratorical contest. This is necessary for the reason that the Association has no funds with which to meet the general expenses incurred in giving the meet. No entrance fee to the athletic events is charged.

Prof. Case informs the Press that he has received notification from Milton, Pendleton and other points in the county that large crowds will be in attendance. Mr. Case has written over 200 letters, so he informs us, to parties throughout the county concerning the meet, and he expects the first annual meet to be a success.

The track will be in first class condition and with the removal of the grand stand to the park, seating accommodations for the spectators of the races and other events, will be provided. Tents will serve as dressing apartments for the athletes and everything possible will be done to make the meet a success. The program in full follows:

DEATH OF A LOVABLE GIRL

Ettabell Swaggart, After Lingerig for Months Passes Away Wednesday.

Ettabell Swaggart, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Swaggart, died Wednesday afternoon at the home of her parents, after lingering since the first of the year with a fatal malady resulting from an attack of appendicitis.

She was a lovable child and bore her suffering with great bravery and fortitude. Some time ago she was afflicted with appendicitis, and all that medical skill could do was accomplished. She apparently rallied for awhile but later declined and was taken to Pendleton for treatment, but continued to fail, and was brought home several days ago.

She was born at the home of her parents north of Athena and at the time of death was aged 15 years and four months. Father, mother, two sisters and two brothers are left to mourn the loss of a kind and lovable sister, but the burden of grief is greatly alleviated in the knowledge that all had been done for the dear one that it was possible to do.

Funeral services were held at the Christian church in this city, of which she was a member, yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock, conducted by Mr. Meldrum. A large concourse of people were in attendance. Many beautiful flowers were in evidence.
