Billy Littlejohn and his Millers must have taken a bunch of horse shoes to Pendleton with them Sunday, for they came off victors after playing Mr. Hollis and Nelsons "Lunatics," a session of nine innings in a blinding dust and sand storm which was so fierce that at times the game had to stop until the gusts rolled by.

Oh, it was fierce, and no day for ball, as the total of 19 hits and 17 errors attest.

Hollis wafted 16 Athena batters, while Picard ozoned four of the Buckaroos, two of them being the last up on the ninth, but the nifty Athena pitcher had it on the ball just the same, for the sphere was falling at his feet all the time and he gets credit for 10 chances without a skip.

Athena opened the basket in the second and helped herself to three runs, by virtue of a double, a single, three errors, a pass and two stolen bases. DePeatt cleared out the double bingle, scoring Lienallen and Bundy, and scored on Schaffer's error.

Hollis, the man who keeps books for the Pendleton Woolen Mills, but whose address is Spokane, and is some pitcher on the side, biffed out a homer in the second for Pendleton. In Athena's half, Picard was safe when Ward dropped the third strike, stole second, was sacrificed to third by Lienallen and scored on a passed ball.

Pendleton came back in the fourth with two. Ward slashed out a double, Hollis reached first on fielder's

choice, Ward anchoring at third when DePeatt erred, scored on a wild pitch, Hollis taking second, from where he scored when Schaffer singled.

Clark scored in the fifth and Lienallen came over with his second run in the sixth and Pelland and Picard tapped the register in the seventh.

Pendleton came back with three runs in their half of the seventh and tallied another in the eighth. With the score standing 8 to 7, Nelson on second and every rooter in Pendleton yelling for a tie-up, Captain Brown passed it up to the pitcher.
