

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

the southern part of the province of Alberta by Professor W. S. Foster, a geologist and explorer, living in Spokane. The cane, which is valued at \$5,000, was presented by Elwin T. Coman, president of the chamber of commerce, on behalf of the people of Spokane.


"The stump, which stood in a peat bed, was found beneath 60 feet of glacial wash," said Professor Foster, giving a history of the discovery, 'and preserved to the present day by one of the wonderful freaks of nature. The peat, from which the stump was taken, is on a sandstone formation and is about three feet in thickness. Seaweeds and flag stocks found nearby are also well preserved.


"This peat bed was uncovered by the wearing away of the glacial wash by floods and the flow of the Old Man river. There is not the least question in my mind that the tree grew He looks as though he hadn't a cent before the glacial period, more than 250,000 years ago, but so far I have not been able to ascertain the kind of wood it is.

"The discovery was made not long ago in the Frank district, which is 250 miles north of Spokane and fully 400 miles east of the Pacific ocean. The presence of well-preserved seaweed and flagstock in abundance, buried under 60 feet of glacial deposit, appears to be sufficient proof of its antiquity, though I have much other evidence of scientific character to bear out all of my assertions. .
