Why this sudden clamor for a bridge at Mission? Who would it benefit. except those selfishly interested in seeing the projected bridge at Thorn Hollow crossing fall through with? There is already a bridge at Cayuse, five miles above Mission, the proposed site of the new bridge. From the Cayuse tridge, two good roads lead to Pendicton; one on each side of the river, making it utterly useless for a bridge at Mission only five miles above Pendleton and a radius of B and one-balf miles of territory north of Mission to the Wild Horse macadam road which has cost the county thousands of dollars to construct -one mile and three-quarters to the dividing line of choice between taking the macadam road or the river road into Pendleton. That's all there is to the territory tributary to the proposed tridge prossing at Mission in comparison with the territory tributary to the proposed bridge at Thorn Hollow which embraces thousands of acres north of the river, the wheat from which goes to the warehouses at Thorn Hollow station besides giving the farmers and traveling putlic ingrees to this part of the county direct instead of being compelled to travel sixteen miles via the Cayuse bridge when the Thorn Hollow crossing is nufordable. It is a well known fact that the county and Indian Department will not build two bridges, nor is there any need of two bridge at this time. But there is a crying need for one at Thorn Hollow and the people of this portion of Umstilla county, where the need is urgently felt, should at once investigate and find who or what interests are at the bottom of the Mission tridge agitation. One mile and three quarters north by two and a-baif up and down the river between the proposed Mission bridge and the Pendleton bridge does not compare very well with the vast territory tributary to and the convenience the Phorn Hollow bridge would serve the large number of people. If location of bridges is to be made in accordance with the whims of automobils speed ers or for the convenience of a few men who have leased Indian lauds stound the Mission and who make their homes in Pendleton, now is the time to find it out. If, on the other band, the general public is to be teneffitted in the matter of bridge loca tion, it is well to learn that also.

The following argument is being used by W. S. U'Ren on behalf of his \$1500 tax exemption which will be voted upon at the coming general election. In it we fail to flud provision wherein it will assist the small town desiring improvements from the sale of tonds, inasmuch as the security in the sales of bonds or other indebtedness, rests on the basis of the taxed valuation of property, and with the proposed \$1500 exemption in effect, at least three-fourths of the property holdings would be attented. Mr. U'Ren says:

Will you or your renders, or some will you or your readers, or some of the mortgage and diamond owners who are opposing the \$1500 Homes Tax Exemption, kindly and fully auswer the following questions?

"\$1500 invested in a mortgage is not taxed in Oregon. Why should not taxed in Oregon.

\$1500 be exempt if it is invested in farm buildings, cows, teams, land clearings and crohards with which to

make a living?

"\$1500 spent for diamonds and jewelry 'in actual use' is by law exempt
from tax in Oregon. Why should not
\$1500 spent for a dwelling house and
furniture 'in actual use' be exempt

from tax?

"The proposed \$1500 Home Tax Exemption does not apply to corporations. The great department stores will get nothing from this, neither will the sky scrapers nor the railroads, but the little merchant may save sometling on his taxel.

"The morteague tax law of Oregon
