The Democrats believe in President Wilson's administration. They have something at which to point with pride. In its endorsement, the State Central Committee furnishes the following for publication:
 President Wilson's administration will be endorsed or rebuked by the voters next month. Maine has already approved him. The nation will accept the result of the November elections as the people's opinion of the President. The European countries will watch the returns to learn whether Mr. Wilson has the support of the American people—whether he speaks with the voice of a united nation when he speaks for peace. The record of the past two years is one of precision and efficiency. More big things have been done in months than were done in years before. This is the record: War with Mexico averted. Income tax effective by constitutional amendment and statute. Annual tax of \$120,000,000 on sugar repealed. Currency law passed, which has universal praise. Election of United States Senators by the people a reality. For the first time in history the vote on Senator will not have to be ratified by the legislature. The national constitution was amended to allow this. Alaska railway law, of which Senator Chamberlain had charge, is the first step toward opening up a vast empire that, without development, in 47 years has yielded \$500,000,000 to the American people. Peace treaties with England, France, Spain, China and numerous smaller powers negotiated. A pleasant contrast to what is going on in Europe. Anti-trust bill passed. Trade Commission bill passed. Rayburn securities bill passed. These three measures go a long way toward securing exact justice between the public and the great industrial corporations. Industrial arbitration act passed. It gives much better facilities for settling great strikes. Agricultural extension act passed. It is believed that this will result in doubling the production of American farms. The foregoing is the President's report to the voters. It is for them to say in November whether they approve, or whether they want these things undone.

Should Charles H. Marsh be elected county judge, the people of Umatilla county will have placed in office a clean, energetic young business man, whose qualifications are such that the taxpayer can rest assured that no touch of grafters can hoodwink him into any deal whereby the county would be loser. No lineal foot deal would go with Charles unless the number of feet were stipulated by contract. He also stands for permanent improvements where necessary, and is opposed to the proposed reactionary movement which, under the guise of retrenchment, would land the county roads back in the condition Judge Maloney found them four years ago. He wishes his position to be understood, and not misunderstood: He stands for straightforward business administration of county affairs, wholly for and in the interest of the taxpayer, and if elected to the office, will be to the county in service just what Jim Maloney and Till Taylor have been to it. Mr. Marsh was raised in Weston—almost close enough to be one of us.

In factories and employment at mechanical trades, the eight hour work day may be applied without much inconvenience or hindrance in the result of production, for the reason that double shifts can be put on the pay roll when necessary. But to apply the eight hour system to agricultural pursuits would necessitate the farmer doubling his operative plant in order to meet the requirements of farm production. This would be necessary, for the reason that operations on the farm must be carried on in daylight, whereas the factory can run day or night. The proposed eight hour law will be promptly swatted by the rural voter, and all other thoughtful persons, as it should be.
