## General Carranza Is- sues Defiant Demand

Washington, D. C.-General Venustiano Carranza, as first chief of the constitutional army, notified the world Tuesday that all communications to his government from outside sources must pass through him.

Carranza's decree reached Washing-  
ton through Rafael Zubaran Capmany,  
his minister of the interior, who tele-  
graphed it to Elises Arredondo, Car-  
ranza's local representative. The or-  
der apparently will make it impos-  
sible for diplomatic representatives of for-  
eign governments to deal with the  
Carranza government except by going  
to Vera Cruz, which they been unwill-  
ing to do lest such action be construed  
as formal recognition.

Already most of the diplomats at  
Mexico City have asked their govern-  
ments for permission to leave when  
the situation becomes intolerable, and  
some of them have been advised to  
use their own discretion.

The order may also affect the activ-  
ity of American consular representa-  
tives, who heretofore have dealt with  
the de facto government, whatever it  
happened to be.

## Accused Aide of Mc- Namara Bros. Found

New York - Matthew A. Schmidt,  
34 years old, was arrested here Mon-  
day as a fugitive from justice on an  
indictment found in Los Angeles in  
October, 1912, charging him with hav-  
ing been implicated in dynamiting the  
Los Angeles Times building. The  
arrest was made on Upper Broadway,  
where detectives had traced him after  
a search of four years.

Detective William J. Burns, who  
accompanied the officer making the  
arrest, said the indictment charged  
that Schmidt was one of the two men  
who went with J. B. McNamara to the  
works of the Giant Powder company  
in California and purchased 1,000  
pounds of dynamite.

Schmidt was held in Magistrate's  
court, on short affidavit, with bail un-  
til February 24 to await extradition.  
When arranged before Magistrate  
McQuade the prisoner said he was a  
mechanic, 34 years old, but refused to  
answer the other customary questions.  
After the arraignment, however, the  
magistrate said the man had confessed  
to him in his chambers that he was  
Matthew A. Schmidt, as alleged in the  
Los Angeles indictment.

## Britain to Divert Food.

London - The foreign office an-  
nounced definitely that if the cargo of  
the American steamship Wilhelmnia  
should be diverted for the relief of the  
distressed in Belgium, the decision to  
send her cargo to a British prize court  
would be reconsidered. Otherwise her  
cargo must be submitted to the de-  
cision of the court.

The Wilhelmnia, which sailed from  
New York with a cargo of food prod-  
ucts for Germany, is at present at Fal-  
mouth. A. G. Hays, an attorney rep-  
resenting the Green company, the con-  
signors of the cargo of the Wilhelm-  
nia, called at the American embassy,  
and went to Falmouth later. He said  
he had not yet received his instructions  
concerning the case, but in the mean-  
time was endeavoring to learn all he  
could about the status of the vessel  
and her cargo.

## Los Angeles Children Thrifty.

Los Angeles - A canvas of the banks  
here shows that 40,000 children under  
sixteen years of age have almost \$1,-  
000,000 in savings deposits, an average  
of \$25 each. One bank has 15,000 de-  
positors between the ages of two and  
fourteen years. The largest account is  
that of a twelve-year old boy who has  
\$1,572. He began seven years ago with  
50 cents. A leading financier de-  
clared on this showing that Los An-  
geles children are the thriftest in the  
world, which he ascribes largely to  
business instruction in the schools.

## Fist Flies for Lincoln.

Portland, Or.-To defend the mem-  
ory of Abraham Lincoln, Corporal M.  
J. Parsons, of Vancouver Barracks,  
pulled an I. W. W. from his soapbox,  
pommelled him severely and knocked  
down several sympathizers who started  
a near-riot. The speaker is said to  
have made remarks derogatory to the  
martyred President. The soldier, who  
sustained several bruises and cuts, was  
treated at the police hospital and re-  
leased with congratulations. Two  
members of the crowd were arrested  
on a charge of disorderly conduct.

## Tiniest Exhibit Arrives.

San Francisco - The smallest and  
most valuable exhibit at the Panama-  
Pacific International Exposition will  
be the fraction of a grain of mesothe-  
rium, a derivative of radium, valued  
at nearly \$300,000 which will be placed  
in the German section of the Palace  
of Liberal Arts. The exhibit is now  
on its way from Hamburg in a lead  
box, carried by a personal representa-  
tive of the discoverer, Dr. Hugo  
Lieber.

## British Strike Averted.

London - The threatened strike of  
several thousand railroad men through-  
out Great Britain, demanding an in-  
crease of wages, seems to have been  
averted. Announcement was made  
following a conference between rail-  
road managers and representatives of  
the union that an agreement had been  
reached, the terms of which will be  
announced later.

## Eight Slain in Panama Fight.

Panama - A fight between soldiers  
and native policemen here resulted,  
according to first reports of the con-  
flict, in the deaths of five policemen  
and three soldiers and the wounding of  
many of the combatants. A carnival  
was in progress and many of the sol-  
diers were on leave to attend the festi-  
vity.

## Catching Up With China.

Gradually, very gradually, civiliza-  
tion is catching up with the Chinese.  
The University of California has es-  
tablished a new profession—that of  
keeping people well. Those who adopt  
this calling will go into the world and  
earn fat fees by not letting food fall ill.  
Sickness will mean starvation to  
the practitioners; a healthy populace  
will make them rich.

In China the doctors have never  
looked to the sick for business. Only  
while their patients were well could  
the physicians charge for services  
rendered. When a patron fell ill the  
doctor's income shrank; when recov-  
ered the convalescent resumed feeling  
his medical adviser.

It is a good scheme, evidently, or  
we of the wiser world would not have  
taken up with it after having so many  
thousands of years to investigate its  
workings. In time perhaps all the  
wisdom of the Celestials will become  
ours by adoption.-St. Joseph Gazette.
