SUNDAY'S GAME TO HELIX
 League President Upholds Rules Gov-
 erning Ineligible Players.
 League Standing:

After winning the game Sunday
 from Helix in the ninth inning by
 Athena, B. B. Richards, president of
 the East End League, sustained a pro-
 test entered by the Helix team involv-
 ing the eligibility of Keefe, substituted
 as a pinch hitter for Harmon, and un-
 der the rules establishing residence
 qualifications, awarded the game to
 Helix.

Keefe, who had not been a resident
 of Athena for the required seven day
 period, was in uniform as a substitute
 player, and in the ninth inning with
 the score 2 to 1 in favor of Helix, two
 down and E. Williams roosting on
 third attempting to put over the tying
 run, Keefe was substituted Harmon,
 and when he laced out a single the
 Helixites entered a protest. After a
 long-chewing matinee, managers, cap-
 tains and umpire agreed to deride
 Keefe, put Williams back on third and
 allow Harmon to bat. The first base-
 man, who had not been swatting any-
 thing but space, poked up a dinky fly
 which Thorne butter-fingered. Will-
 iam's drilled for home and when the
 balloon was anchored, Harmon was
 perched on second, having policed
 the pillow during the melee. Then
 DePaat pulled one of his emergency
 stunts by contributing a sizzling sin-
 gle, scoring Harmon with the winning
 run. And there you "was."

The consensus of opinion is that
 President Richards awarded the game to
 whom it justly belongs, and his
 action in upholding the rules as agreed
 to by the league organization will
 serve to allay any contention that
 might hereafter arise relative to re-
 sidence qualifications of players.

Both teams went out to win Sunday
 and there was pep and ginger to spare.
 The pitchers worked well. The error
 columns, it will be noticed, are popu-
 lated to some extent, but there were
 many good plays to offset them. E.
 Williams was the star performer with
 the wagon tongue, glancing three hits
 off Thorne's delivery in four times up.
 E. Williams connected for a 3-sacker
 and Stone selected one for two bases.

County courts have no authority to
 order alterations made in assessments
 after the county equalization boards
 have finished their work, according to
 an announcement by the state tax
 commission. The ruling was made in
 connection with an answer to a letter
 of the tax collector of Baker county,
 who said that the County court had
 issued an order for him to make an
 alteration in an assessment, and he de-
 clined to do it. The commission held
 that if a taxpayer was dissatisfied
 with an assessment he should appear
 before the board of equalization, and
 if not satisfied with its findings, could
 appeal to the circuit court.

Roosevelt wants to get back into
 the republican party. What a drop
 for the high and mighty Teddy after
 all the stunts he heaped upon the G.
 O. P. But then, it was probably some-
 thing business for one poor, lone Bull
 Moose to be flopping by himself. He
 had practically dropped out of sight
 and hearing and that was one thing he
 couldn't stand. There's no way to
 keep him from going back, but there
 won't be any killing of milk-fed veal
 over his return, we opine.

The Walla Walla Union, in its
 column reviewing events that trans-
 pired 41 years ago, notes that "there
 is now a large quantity of wheat being
 hauled from town and country, the
 most of it being placed on the cars
 at the Touchet. After a time it is not
 probable that any will be hauled in
 wagons further than the railroad."

The State portage railway equip-
 ment now useless at Celilo could be
 profitably utilized on a roadbed from
 Cold Spring Landing to Holdman for
 the transportation of wheat. This
 would appear to be the practical solu-
 tion of the Cold Spring road problem,
 a hard-surface autotruck road to the
 contrary notwithstanding.

No kick would come from Germany
 if she were receiving war munitions
 from this country. The allies are in
 a position to handle American com-
 merce and Germany has no holler
 coming. America has the goods to
 sell, and the open market gets them.

Ten automobiles sold here in two
 weeks is some record, and indicates
 the financial standing of the commu-
 nity. Good crop prospects with expect-
 ed high prices for grain, helped the
 salesman to dispose of the machines.

 ifornia comes to Oregon for dairy
 stock, but not surprising. One of the
 large dairymen of Calusa county
 bought several carloads near Portland
 recently.

 helped along the prospects in the low-
 land districts. It never rains but

 ity.
