

Jaggery Sugar. Though a Tunil poen enumerates Soo ways in which the Patmya palm may be used, one of its most interesting uses is the production of a sugar called jaggery. This is the result of boiling down the fresh juice and is one of the chief sugars of South India. Four or five quarts per tree per day is the yield for four or five months.

Once in every three years the sap drawing process is omlitted, as other while the tree would die The tree be glus to yield at lifteen years and continues for about fifty years. The fe-male tree yields about twice as much

sup as the male. Three quarts of this sap make one pound of sugar or jag-gery, which is the chief sugar used by the poor classes of India.-Argonaut.




