Pendleton papers report that word has been received there from Congressman Sinnott stating that the House has approved the items in the Indian appropriation bill, providing funds and authorizing the construction of the two wagon bridges over the Umatilla river at Mission and Thorn Hollow crossing. It also said that the two Oregon Senators are inclined to support this appropriation, so the prospects of securing the bridges are considered favorable. The bill calls for an appropriation of about \$19,000, to which the county is required to add \$9,000 additional and guarantee the repair and maintenance of the bridges after they are built.

During the week the elements have been ideal for making away with the phenomenal snowfall of last week. Warm winds and rain during the day and freezing weather at night permitted the snow to disappear gradually, most of the moisture going into the ground, until now there is not much danger of a flood except from the watershed north of town, where the melting process may yet send a large volume of water down the flat. Chinook winds have removed the snow from the foot hills east of town, and in the Walla Walla valley high waters damaged the O. W. tracks. All trains on that road from Walla Walla to Pendleton were snarled and today a stub train passed through here from Pendleton only to Milton and return. The Northern Pacific got one train into Athena yesterday the crew reporting the track covered with water in the vicinity of Waterman Station.

MRS. F. G. SWAGGART BURIED

Death Occurred at Farm Near Enterprise, on Feb. 4.

The funeral of Mrs. Anna Swaggart, the young wife of Frank Swaggart, of Enterprise, Walla Walla county, occurred yesterday, February 10, at 2 o'clock at the Christian church, services being conducted by Pastor Davis Errett. The large auditorium was filled with sympathizing friends, and the floral offerings were profuse.

The circumstances of the death of Mrs. Swaggart were unusually sad, as four little children, the youngest being only a few days old, are left with the young husband to mourn her loss. Death was due to valvular heart trouble and came unexpectedly in the presence of the physician and nurse, when all was thought to be well.

Deceased was twenty four years old on June 2, last, and was married on September 26, 1908, her maiden name being Anna Shove. She died on February 4, 1916.

Owing to the snow blockades, Mr. Swaggart was compelled to come by sled from Enterprise to Minam, making the trip with difficulty. He returned yesterday, driving to Pendleton and was accompanied by his mother, Mrs. A. L. Swaggart, who will remain with him at his farm 15 miles from Enterprise, for some time.

School Notes.

The Athena High School girls' and boys' basket ball teams won both games of a double-header last Saturday night from Columbia College and Dayton High school, respectively, the girls' score being 25-16 and the boys' 27-21. Both games were exceedingly interesting.

The girls' game was played with one line, which made it much faster than the two-line game. Pauline Myrick made four baskets from the foul line and Kathryn Froome threw two field baskets in the first half making four points each. Jennie Cass one of the Columbia forwards, made three field baskets and two foul baskets in the first half, and Myrtle Cox, the other Columbia forward, scored one field basket and two points from the foul line making the score 12 to 8 in favor of Columbia at the end of the first half. Very soon after the second half started, Athena tied the score and forged ahead and the Columbia girls never again caught them. Pauline Myrick scored five field goals and six fouls in this period, while Kathryn Froome made two field baskets. Jennie Cass made two field baskets in the last half which finished the scoring of the visitors. The girls lined up as follows: Athena, Forwards, Pauline Myrick and Kathryn Froome; Centers, Hazel Sanders and Dolly White; Guards, Hoby Banister and Marguerite McLennan; For Columbia, Forwards, Jennie Cass and Myrtle Cox; Centers, Avis Vinocoe and Evelyn Herd; Guards, Maizie Covigall and Edith Boyd.

The boys' game was a good, fast contest, even though the Athena quintet was much lighter in weight. They were faster and displayed better team work than their opponents. McPherson made eleven points for Athena by throwing two field goals and two fouls in the first half and three fouls and one field basket in the last half. Tharp threw three field goals in the first period and one in the last, while Booher made one field basket and two fouls in the first period and two field goals in the last half. For Dayton, during the first half, Gard made four fouls, Kendall made two field baskets, and Schlegel made one field goal. At the end of the first half, the score stood 16 for Athena, Dayton 10. It is expected the present team will give a good account of themselves, as did the five that opposed the Ferndale teamers four weeks ago.

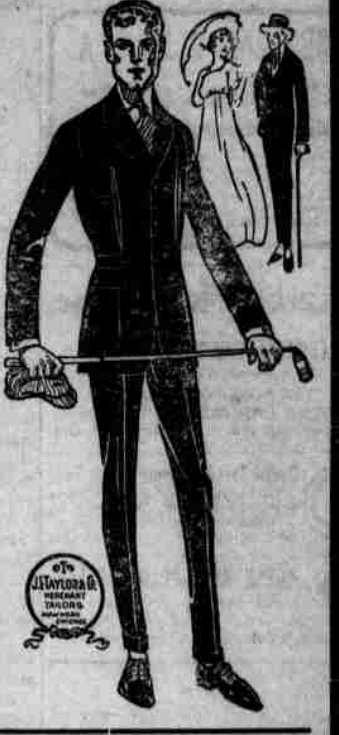
