At a meeting of the Original Good Roads Association held this date the


following resolution was passed: Whereas, the Original Good Ronds Association of Umatilla county, hav-ing petitioned the county court to sub-mit the question of a 2-mill special millage tax for the construction of per-manent roads, to the voters at the primary election May 19th, and where-as the district attorney has advised the court that such vote would be advisory only without legal effect, in view of this fact and insamuch as the court bas ordered the \$980,000 road bond issue to be placed upon the ballot at the primary nominating election, therefore be it

Resolved, that this association request the county court permission to withdraw our request to have the millage tax voted upon at the primary election May 19th. The district attorney having advised that the millage tax would be of no legal effect, we deem it best to have the vote a straight issue as for or against the \$980,000 road bonds, and be it fur-

Resolved, that we are unalterably opposed to the proposed road bond is-sue and advise submitting the millage tax question to a vote at the general election in November by an initiative petition, provided this can be done le-gally and the bond issue is defeated.
