300 INLAND EMPIRE FARMERS VOTE BULK SYSTEM IN HANDLING CROP.

AMBITION IS TO MAKE NEW | the necessity of immediate action by PLAN THIS YEAR BY DIS-CARDING SACKS.

Spokane, Wn., May 7, 1916. About 300 farmers of the Ioland Empire assembled in the Spokane Chamber of Commerce Assembly rooms yesterday, and with only five opposing votes, de cided to handle their grain in bulk in-

stead of sacks.

We telleve that a successful system of bandling grain in bulk depends upon the farmer providing his own storage on the farm, either by tius, gran-aries or farm elevators, where grain

the present flat warehouses can be successfully adapted, at comparatively small expense, to bandling grain in talk Fall assurance has been given by the railway officials and terminal warehouses that they will meat farmers and interior warehousemen in arranging for the full handling of grain in bolk.

In answer to the argument that grain must be sacked for exportation from the Pacific cossi, authentic reports show that less than 25 per cent of the grain from the Northwest is experted annually, and the Panama Caual has removed the necessity of sacking the greater part of the small per-centage of the crop that is expected.

The grain prices in the world's mar ket are quoted on a bulk basis, there tore there will be no difference in the price of bulk grain or sacked grain when the bulk system prevails through out this territory.

Since it is practically the manimous opinion of the 300 grain growers at this convention that a change to made plans and guaranteed materin the Island Empire from sacked grain to balk grain, we therefore urge ial prices are furnished.


