In the course of the bank statements made to the comptroller of the currency at the close of business on June 30th, an occasion for comparison of the statements of other banks of the county with that made by the First National Bank of Athena, is noted. For instance, the deposits of the local bank total \$607,541.80, while the combined deposits of the Farmers Bank of Weston, (\$114,488.43) the First National Bank of Milton Freewater, (\$392,962.99), the Farmers Security Bank of Milton, (\$48,655.71), total in the aggregate, \$556,007.13. These statements show the banks and the communities in which they are located to be in prosperous condition, but the result is very flattering to Athena and her banking institution, revealing as it does \$51,534.67 more in deposits than is shown by the four other banks combined.

THE "FORLORN HOPE."

Real Meaning of a Misused Term in the Vocabulary of War

In the titles of every war one hears a great deal about "forlorn hopes." The term is one of the most misused in the vocabulary of war. It is commonly understood to mean a desperate venture. It really means "lost troops" that is, "detached troops."

The word "hope" in the phrase is not an English but a Dutch word. "Hoop" meaning literally "hoop" and secondarily body of troops. The word "forlorn" represents the Dutch "verloren"—lost. A "forlorn hope" was a detached body of troops thrown out in front of the main line of battle to find the enemy and engage them first. This was the regular strength and seventeenth century practice, and though it was one of the more dangerous kinds of service, it was not desperate in the English sense, forlorn.

Nowadays much the same work is done by the detached bodies of cavalry which are thrown out before the main line of battle without communications or supplies to find the enemy. "Capitulation" is another term of war which is very assiduously used. It does not mean surrender, but surrender on terms. In fact, it means the terms, not the surrender. It is from the Latin "capitulum" or "leading" from which is derived our word "chapter", and a capitulation is a formal treaty of surrender drawn up under a series of headings or chapters embodying the terms on each point—Manchester Guardian

Teakwood

The fact that teakwood is scarce, grained, grown to the north and possesses an offensive odor kept it in the remote with English shipbuilders until 1807, when British shipbuilding and railway interests began to recognize the value of Indian teak. During the next seven years all the shipbuilding countries in the world joined in an ever increasing demand for this timber until its prices were forced up to a figure much beyond their normal rates. It has practically become the staple of the local wood industry for

the greater part of the entire Indian continent. Teak is being freely planted by the Indian forestry service in the important civil stations all over India, even as far north as Saranar pur, Behra Dun and Lahore—Argo nut

WINDS THAT WHISTLE.

The Sounds Come Only When the Air Waves Meet Resistance

Did you ever notice that although you may feel the force of the wind when you are out in it, you do not hear it whistle unless you are close to a building? This is because the sound is produced according to the same principles as apply to the production of the tones of a pipe organ or any instrument on which the tones are produced by blowing.

In order to make the whistling sounds we hear from the wind it is necessary for it to blow against something. That is why we hear it when we are in the house or some other building.

The whistling is caused by the wind blowing past the sharp edge of some obstacle in its path or finding its way through small openings offering some sharp edged resistance.

If you blow through a long tube or pipe you will produce no sound, but if there is an opening with a sharp edge near the end where you blow the blowing will cause a distinct sound. It is on this principle that all small whistles, organ pipes and wind instruments of an orchestra are made.

Another way in which the wind produces sounds is by blowing against objects which vibrate. A curious instance of this is the humming volume of sound produced by the wind blowing through a group of telegraph wires and which may be noted, even when there is not a great force of wind, by placing the ear against a telegraph pole—Boston Herald.

Trade Name Basis of \$100,000 Court Action

Levi Strauss & Co. Suing Salt Lake City Firm

A temporary injunction was granted yesterday against J. C. Penney & Co. of Salt Lake and A. P. Leimance, California agent of the Salt Lake firm, by Judge J. J. Van Nostrand, prohibiting them from using the trade name "Koveralls." Levi Strauss & Co. are the complainants. Levi Strauss & Co. allege that it created the trade name in 1912, and has spent \$100,000 for advertising it.

In addition to a permanent injunction, the Levi Strauss Company also asks for \$100,000 damages, claiming that its advertising has been nullified by the alleged act of the Salt Lake manufacturers.
