Experts tell us, however, that of all the grain that was taken by distilieries the country over, only 40 per cent went into whisky. This estimate would indicate a saving of 40,000,000 bushels of grain a year for food purposes. There need be no fear of a whisky famine, for the stock accumulated by the distillers and stored is described as enormous. Meanwhile, the government will continue the collection of heavy taxes on this stock, and its revenues from this source may be even greater than before the manufacture was stopped.—From "The Progress of the World," in the American Review of Reviews for October, 1917.
