WHAT LIBERTY BONDS WILL BUY FOR ARMY

1 \$100 bond will buy overcoats, slick-
ers and blankets for 3 soldiers and
mess kits for 15.

2 \$100 bonds will buy 5 complete
rifles with bayonets, 1 automatic
pistol and 250 rounds of ammunition.

3 \$100 bonds will buy 6 airplane de-
molition bombs (the kind dropped on
munition factories and dumps, trains,
stations, etc.) and 24 signal flares.

4 \$100 bonds will buy 20 airplane in-
cendiary bombs.

5 \$100 bonds will buy 20 airplane
fragmentation bombs (the kind drop-
ed on masses of troops), and 11 hand
grenades.

6 \$100 bonds will buy 10 airplane
flares (each of which will light up
4 square miles of ground at night).

7 \$100 bonds will buy a trench knife,
steel helmet and 1 day's rations for
216 men.

8 \$100 bonds will buy mess kits, can-
teens and trenching picks for a

wheel horses of 4 artillery teams.

strong-points and machine gun nests

INSECT PRODUCTS OF VALUE

Many Small Creatures Make Contribu-
tions to the Country's Wealth of
No Insignificant Amount.

We have many insect products of no
small value. Most familiar are honey
and wax from the bee.

There is also a Chinese bug which
secretes a kind of grease on various
trees. This hardens into wax, and is
collected, melted and purified, when it
becomes white and glossy in appear-
ance, and when mixed with oil can be
made into candles. The cochineal, a
scale insect living on cacti in the Ameri-
can tropics, besides having medicinal
qualities, yields the two dyes called
carmine and lake. While nowadays
most dyes are chemically made, the
natural dye of the cochineal is em-
ployed in coloring soldiers' uniforms,
as it stands the weather better than
commercial dyes. The pupae of a Mexi-
can black fly which swarms in great
quantities near Lake Texcoco are used
as fertilizer. No enlargement is need-
ed on the work of the precious silk-
worm—a native of China which is now
raised here also. Commercial shellac
is obtained by melting lac, the resinous
substance produced by an East Indian
scale insect and deposited in a crust
on twigs to contain the insect and its
eggs. The export value of lac from
India in one year has risen as
high as \$3,000,000 rupees. Lac has also
been used to make dyes, but while the
lac industry is a growing one, the em-
ployment of lac in making dyes has
probably had its day. The best lac is
obtained from Bengal and the central
provinces of India. It is also used as
stiffening for hats, sealing wax, as an
ingredient of lithographic ink, in elec-
trical work and in the manufacture of
gramophone records.

SPRING FESTIVAL IN CHINA

Beginning of the Year is a Time of
Rejoicing Throughout the
Whole Country.

In the United States one knows that
spring has come when he sees boys
playing marbles and flying kites. In
China, says the Christian Science
Monitor, there are regular spring-play-
ing festivals that all the people have
a part in and which are especially in-
teresting for children.

Just when the spring festival comes
depends on the moon. It is the be-
ginning of the year in China, and in
the first moon the magistrates and other
important persons in the town go
out in a procession "to meet the
spring."

It is at the lantern festival, the 15th
of the first month, that the children
have the best time. Brightly colored
lanterns are everywhere, at the doors
of shops and houses, and carried in
processions. Boughs of evergreen are
also placed above the doors, and there
is an abundance of "moon cakes," lit-
tle round sweet rice cakes.

The boys dress up in all sorts of fan-
tastic clothes, sing, dance and give lit-
tle plays. They wear masks of ani-
mals and of human faces. Companies
of them go about through the streets
of their villages, and from one village
to another. Now and then a group of
masks will be seen on high stilts.
There is a very pretty dance where
every dancer carries a lighted lantern.
This is called the lantern dance.

Explaining "Mizpah."

Mizpah or Mizpeh is the name of
several towns in Palestine. The name
is derived from a verb of the ancient
Hebrew signifying to look or watch
out. The word occurs in several places
in the Old Testament. The first men-
tion is the most significant. Jacob and
his prospective father-in-law, Laban,
met on a slope of Mt. Gilead and en-
tered into a covenant. Laban had sev-
eral times violated his agreement as
to the wages he was paying Jacob, and
Jacob demanded a fair deal. When
they came to an agreement they raised
a monument of stones, which Laban
declared should be called "Galead, and
Mizpah." "This heap shall be a wit-
ness between me and thee this day.
The Lord watch between me and thee,
when we are absent, one from the
other." This passage is used as a
benediction by the Young People's So-
ciety of Christian Endeavor.

British Columbia's Coal.

Writing of the discovery of coal in
British Columbia, Johnson in his "First
Things in Canada," states: "One day
in December, 1849, an officer of the
Hudson's Bay company in Fort Victo-
ria was informed by the foreman of
the blacksmith's shop that an old Na-
namo Indian chief had just stated that
he knew where there was 'stuff' like
that which the white man was using in
the blacksmith's fire. The Indian was
told that if he would bring some pieces
of the 'stuff' he would have his gun
repaired free and receive a bottle of
rum. The chief reappeared in the fol-
lowing April (1850) with his canoe
laden with coal. A prospecting party
went out and found the coal where the
chief of Nanaimo now stands. In 1854
the production of coal from the Na-
namo mines amounted to 1,000 tons;
in 1898 it exceeded 1,000,000 tons.

Census of a Vacant Lot.

In a little town in Illinois George N.
Wolcott conducted an investigation to
find out how many animals—or, rather,
forms of animal life—inhabited an
acre of city land, says Popular Science
Monthly. The count in a city lot, ob-
tained by multiplying the contents of
a bucketful by the figures required for
an acre, disclosed the fact that there
were between 2,000,000 and 2,500,000 of
grasshoppers, locusts, crickets, cock-
roaches, earwigs, lantern flies, plant
lice, aphids and other "bugs" in one
acre of land.

There will be, of course, a large vari-
ation in the count according to the
season in which it is made. For ex-
ample, there is a one-third increase in
the population in the spring over that
in the autumn owing to the rapid mul-
tiplication of earthworms.

The Lowly Cider.

Long despised as a waste product,
the humble cider is coming into its
own. For years ciders were anthra-
cized because the only purpose they
seemed to fill was to get into one's
eye, but with the widespread use of
cider, ciders came into use as a

dose for cement sidewalks, cellar bot-
toms, etc. As a porous material to
carry water away from a cellar a few
feet of cinders placed around the foot-
ings make excellent drainage, while as
a fill for holding wooden sleepers in
place in concrete, cinders mixed with
cement make a light, firm bond. As a
base for driveways, cinders, when wa-
ter-bonded, and rolled or tamped, make
a firm foundation.
