

**PAVE MAIN STREET.**

With the hardsurfacing of the macadam highway through Athena, and a portion of it at least on Main street, the opportunity is presented for the paving of the street from the O.-W. R. & N. depot to the intersection of Fifth street, a distance of five blocks.

Perhaps never again would such favorable conditions be encountered for doing this work, so far as assemblage of equipment and men is concerned. The Warren Construction company would be on the ground with its plant, in performance of its contract work on the state highway. Thus the contracting company would be in a position to pave the entire width of the street with the one operation required of its machinery and men, already employed by it in state and county work.

Athena's macadamized street has served its purpose long and well, but at a frightful cost of maintenance. In the aggregate, thousands of dollars have been expended in the years since the macadam has been in use, for water binding, and of later years for oiling the surface of the street.

But now the wearing life of the macadam has become exhausted and its deterioration may be witnessed in the general breaking up of the surface, marked by depressions over the entire length of the thoroughfare which is invariably followed by the gouging out process entailed by constant automobile traffic. The stability of the present macadam surface has ceased to exist.

To remodel the street with macadam would be sheer folly in the face of past experience, to say nothing of the permanency of bitulithic construction over that of the macadamized method.

It would seem that Athena with her street, is in much the same plight in which the county was confronted with her macadam road—in order to save what she has left of the road, she sensibly proceeded to hardsurface it.
