LEPER COLONY LENDS FREELY

Honolulu — The Penikese Island Leper Colony, Hawaiian Islands, bought War Savings Stamps to the amount of \$62 per capita. There were thirty-two purchasers among the lepers. This amount is three times as much as the per capita quota for the United States, which is \$20.

The total sales of War Savings and Thrift Stamps for Hawaii amounted to \$2,020,000—beating quota by \$20,000.


