Albert J. Beveridge, the Indiana author and statesman, who was once something of a radical in politics, now exhibits pronounced conservative tendencies. He even condemns the "farm bloc" as a product of the new order that interferes with the accustomed progress of legislation. It is probable that growth in years and experience, and the thoughtful study of economic and political questions, has convinced Mr. Beveridge that established principles of government are not to be overturned in a day by visionary reformers. Here in Oregon we have found that the direct primary, the initiative, the referendum and the recall, are not the cure-alls they were widely heralded to be for the ills of the body politic. We are all likely to be better off when we come to depend less upon governmental frills and fancies, and more upon fulfillment of the obligations of a vigilant, faithful and conscientious citizenship.
