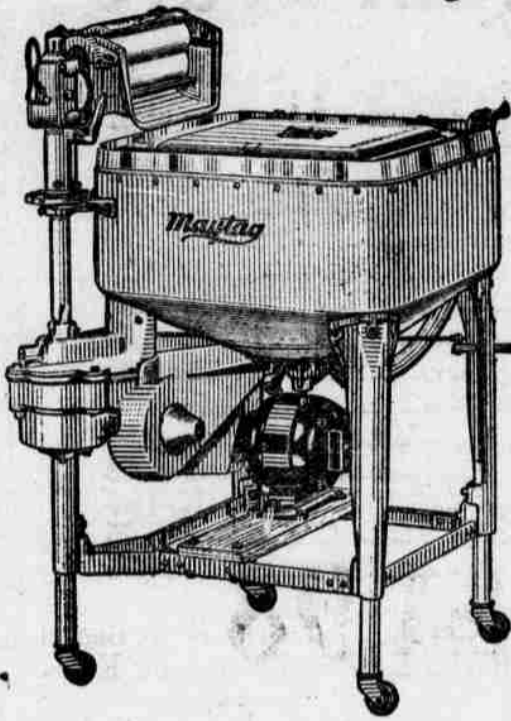

January 15, 1904

The way matters now look the building era in Athena for 1904 will perhaps be inaugurated by J. E. Froom, proprietor of the St. Nichols hotel. Mr. Froom has made arrangements for the construction of a two story brick building on Main street adjoining his hotel on the west. The site of the new building will occupy a 35-foot frontage, and will be erected where Parker's barber shop and the old post office building now stands.

LIMIT ON CATCH REDUCED STREAMS CLOSED TO FISHING

At sessions of the state game commission held in Portland this week, many streams and portions of streams have been closed to trout fishing, and the bag limit has been reduced in all sections of the state.

Closed streams in Umatilla county are: Umatilla river 300 feet below three-mile diversion dam; south fork of Umatilla river and tributaries; south and north forks of Meacham creek; north fork of Walla Walla river; south fork of Walla Walla river from power plant up river for a distance of 6 miles; north fork of McKay creek and tributaries; Pearson creek and tributaries; East Birch creek; Butter creek and tributaries; Squaw, Ryan, Buckaroo and Bear creeks, all closed 10 years.

Coincident with the establishment of the new regulations, planting of larger fish than heretofore will be begun by the hatcheries department under the direction of Mat Ryckman, state superintendent of hatcheries for the game commission. These will be liberated in closed waters to permit them to become wild before angling for them is begun.

Several changes in general regulations, operative during 1926 only, were made. The bag limit on trout was reduced in all sections of the state to 30 fish or 15 pounds and a fish in any one day, or 60 fish or 30 pounds and a fish in any seven consecutive days for each person. The open season for trout in all counties of the state except Klamath county in 1926 will be from April 15 to October 31, inclusive. In Klamath county the season will run from April 15 to November 30, inclusive, under the new regulation.

Open season for hunting Chinese pheasants in all sections of the state where there is an open season, except in Malheur county, will be from October 15 to October 21, inclusive, during the year 1926 only, under the new regulations.

Restoring Books

Books that have lain long in a damp place and acquired a musty smell should be thoroughly aired and exposed to the sunlight for several days. This should arrest the odor. Mildew may be checked by brushing over the books with spirits of wine or a few drops of essential oil, such as oil of cloves, applied with a soft cloth. The books should be dusted frequently.
