





mans of yesterday a predatory nation makes them today converts to pacifism. It was absolutely necessary, therefore, for the German people to escape from their distressing isolation. They must restore the world's confidence in themselves before they could recover the place in the world they occupied before the war. America, sitting tight on her strong-box and eager to pacify the universe, said to the French: 'Disarm!' The French answered: 'Impossible! The wicked Germans would destroy us.' That is the history of the Locarno."

#### WARBLES

American farmers pay \$50,000,000 each year in beef, milk and hides because of the "warble fly," according to the United States department of ascriculture educational film "The Ox Warble-A Fifty-Million Dollar Tune." The warble as an adult is an innocent appearing fly which alights on the legs of cattle and lays its eggs. The microscopic grubs that hatch from the eggs burrow through the hide and work their way to the animal's gullet and thence to the back, where they become full sized. They perforate the hide and drop to the ground to go through certain changes of form, then emerge as adult flies and begin the cycle all over again. Often as many as 200 grub holes will be found in a single hide, and the total damage to hides alone is tremendous. The presence of the grubs also causes the animals to lose weight and keeps down milk production. Actual photography and animated drawings trace the life history of the insect, and methods of controlling the pest are emphasized in the department of agriculure film.
