EXPORTS INCREASE

According to the figures compiled by the Traffic Department of the Port of Portland Commission exports of wheat for the first three weeks of January 1926 amounted to 1,361,383 bushels valued at \$2,033,139. This is more wheat than was exported from Portland during the firs t eight months of 1925. The year 1925 was rather peculiar in the export of wheat for during the fall of 1924 most of the crop of that year was shipped, there being little for shipment during the spring as is shown for the first eight months of 1925. During the fall of 1925 considerable wheat was shipped, but not nearly as much as the previous year, due to the fact that a considerable portion was and still is held in the interior. 
